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Introduction

This document contains information about Orbix 3.0.1 and later versions, including build information, information about new features, and details of faults that have been fixed in this release.

Orbix 3.0.1 and Later Versions

This section describes changes made in Orbix 3.0.1.

Development Environments

This section describes the compiler and operating system versions that Orbix 3.0 has been built and tested with. The following applies to both multi-threaded and single-threaded variants of Orbix 3.0.

Solaris 7

Orbix 3.0.2 has been built on Solaris 7 using SPARC C++ compiler version 5.0 using the following patches

106327-05 - Solaris 7 Patch to C runtime 107295-01 - Patch for WorkShop IPE 5.0

107355-02 - Patch for dbx

Solaris 2.5.1

Orbix 3.0.1 has been built on Solaris 2.5.1 using the SPARC C++ compiler version 4.2. Patches 103640-27 (kernel and libthread patch) and 103627-10 (linker patch) should be installed on your system. Both patches are included in the "Solaris 2.5.1 Recommended Patch Cluster" from Sun Microsystems, dated May 26th.

For Solaris 2.6, patch 105568-11 or higher (libthread.so.1 patch) should be installed on your system. This patch has a dependency on patch 105210 (libc.so.1 patch), that is patch 105210 must be installed.

Orbix 3.0 for Solaris 7 Release Notes

Testing of Orbix 3.0.1 was carried out on Solaris 2.5.1 and 2.6 and SPARC compiler version 4.2.

The Orbix 3.0.1 libraries contain RTTI information.

Year 2000 compliance

If you are using either Solaris 2.5.1 or 2.6, the Solaris recommended patch cluster should be installed as well as the patches below. More information about the recommended patch cluster is available at:

HP-UX 10.20

Orbix 3.0.1 has been built and tested on HP-UX10.20 using the Cfront compiler version A.10.36 with patch phss-13124 installed. This product has also been built and tested with ANSI compiler A.01.18.

Testing of Orbix 3.0.1 was carried out on HP-UX10.20 on 700 and 800 series machines. Orbix has been compiled with +DAportable.

Orbix must now be compiled with the <code>-ext</code> flag to enable support for the <code>long</code> long and <code>unsigned</code> long long data types. Failure to do this results in compilation errors.

Threading Support on HP-UX

In order to use Orbix on HP-UX, the operating system threading support should have been installed using is the 'install and core OS' for HP-UX 10.20 CD and the subset DCE programming environment.

IRIX 6.5

Orbix 3.0.1 has been built and tested on IRIX 6.5 using the MIPSpro compiler 7.2.1.

NT 4.0

Orbix 3.0.1 has been built and tested on NT 4 with service pack 4 installed, using the VC compiler version 6 service pack 2.

Win-95 and Win-98

Orbix 3.0.1 supports development and deployment of clients on these platforms. This includes clients that receive callbacks from servers.

New Features in Orbix 3.0.1 and Later Versions

This section describes new features added to Orbix 3.0.1 and later versions.

Server Context Handler API Changes

Testing of thread-per-request filters and service context handlers uncovered a flaw in the thread safety of the current mechanism. As a result of this flaw, requests can corrupt service context data for other requests in certain conditions.

There is now a new service context handler class:

Bugs Fixed in Orbix 3.0.1and Later Versions

This section describes the bugs fixed in this release. All bugs are cross platform unless otherwise stated. The bugs are broken down by module and described in terms of the following:

Incident ID

This is the reference number used by the development teams to track bugs, which may in turn relate to one or more PRs (problem reports) as reported by customers.

PR Number

Not all bugs fixed have a PR number (the number assigned by IONA support when a call is logged).

Synopsis

This is a short description of the reported problem. A description of the fix is included where necessary.

Known Problems, Workarounds, and Tips

This section summarizes known issues and tips relating to Orbix 3.0.1 and later versions.

Const* Char Warning

Orbix 3.0.2 for Solaris 7: A const * char warning may be flagged in the server side _DISPATCH routine. This will be corrected in future releases.

SPAR Compiler Stream Bug

Orbix 3.0.2 for Solaris 7: In the demos in opt/iona/demos (if opt/iona is your root directory) you might need a double return to enter values in the demos. This is due to a bug in the SPARC compiler stream files in the getline function. This is a known error and the equivalent bug id is Bug Id: 4280541.

To Remove Inlining

Orbix 3.0.2 for Solaris 7: When compiling demos use a –d flag in the Makefiles to get rid of inlining.

Porting Existing Code

Orbix 3.0.2 for Solaris 7: You must regenerate stub code when porting existing code.

Use of Underscore in IORs

Use of the underscore character is not supported in IORs.

IIOP 1.1 and SSL

IIOP 1.1 IOR profiles do not contain the SSL tagged component.

Performance of Anys

In Orbix 3.0 there is a known performance issue relating to the use of the CORBA: : Any data type. This issue has been partially addressed in Orbix 3.0.2

Length of Configuration Strings

The configuration files used by Orbix consist mainly of "name = value" pairs where the "value" is written as a string. The maximum length of a string literal is 256 characters. If you need to specify a longer string, you can do this by concatenating several string literals together with the "+" operator. For example:

This limitation that a string literal cannot be longer than 256 characters will be most noticeable if you want to embed an IOR inside a configuration file. In this case, you might need to split the IOR into several strings and join them together with the "+" operator, as illustrated in the above example.

Orbix Code Generation ToolKit 3.0.1

This section describes changes made in Orbix Code Generation Toolkit 3.0.1.

New Features

The following new features have been added in this release.

Java Genies

The Orbix Code Generation Toolkit includes Java code generation genies for use with OrbixWeb. Using these genies, you can generate start point code for client-server applications, or generate complete client-server examples, based on the input IDL.

In addition to the application Java source files, the genie also generates a makefile that facilitates building the application. The makefile can be in nmake or make format. You should therefore have one of these installed.

Client-server applications in Java can lead to large projects with extensive source trees. To facilitate ease of building (and rebuilding), a Java dependency generator utility called JavaDeps is included in this release (see "Third Party Contributions" on page 12). This is a pure Java application that takes as input a list of Java sources in your project and generates a makefile dependency list for inclusion in the generated makefile. Any changes to the existing source tree only require the changed sources and their dependents to be recompiled, thereby saving a considerable amount of time. The dependency file need only be generated once provided there are no additional sources added or removed from the tree.

Building a Java Application

To build a typical Java application, perform the following steps:

1. Enter the following command:

2. To generate the makefile dependency list, enter make depend. This performs the following:

- 3. To build the complete project, enter make.
- 4. To register the server persistently, enter make putit.
- 5. To run the server peristently, enter make runserver. This is best done in separate window.
- 6. Enter make runclient.

All IDL compiler-generated sources are placed in the default output directory <code>java_output/NoPackage</code> and belong in the package <code>NoPackage</code>. (this may be changed by editing the <code>idlgen.cfg</code>). In addition, a sub package can be created by specifying a package name with the IDL compiler <code>-jP <package name></code> option.

Note: Users with MSVC++ installations can use nmake in place of make in the steps outlined in this section.

Third Party Contributions

This release of the Orbix Code Generation Toolkit contains Win32 ports of the GNU C++ preprocessor and GNU make utilities from the Cygwin project at Cygnus (www.cygnus.com). The JavaDeps utility from Steve Robbins (steve@nyongwa.montreal.qc.ca) is included also. The JavaDeps Home Page can be found at the following URL:

Incidents Cleared in This Release

This section describes the incidents cleared in this release. All incidents are cross platform unless otherwise stated. The incidents are described in terms of **Incident ID**, **PR Number**, and **Synopsis**, as described on page 8.

Incorrect group permissions set on Solaris package installation.

Documentation Errata

This section details some documentation errors in the 3.0c Orbix Code Generation Toolkit Programmer's Guide.

p.50 – arguments to idlgen -jp hould be '-jP'

This page details making an application with the Java genies which is incorrect, please see section *Building an Application* above for details on how to make a genie generated application.

p.53 – The Java genie does not come with a *-batch* option. Also the *-*jp option should read *-*jP.

pp.54,62,64 - The '-jp "myPackage" ' should read '-jP "myPackage" '

p.61 – The java_genie does not come with a *-batch* option. Also the *-*jp option should read *-*jP.

p.246 – Section title "Equality Functions". Opening line mentions cpp_print, cpp_random and cpp_equal. Should be java_print, java_random and java_equal respectively.

Known Problems, Workarounds and Tips

This section summarizes known problems, workarounds and tips with the Orbix Code Generation Toolkit. A list of the known limitations of IDLgen is provided in Chapter 1 of the *Orbix Code Generation Toolkit Programmer's Guide*.

Configuration Issues

On Win32 platforms, update the PATH environment variable to include the following path:

orbix_install_dir\contrib\Cygwin

This allows you to access the third-party utilities.

On Win32 platforms, edit the idlgen.preprocessor.cmd option in the idlgen.cfg file. Change this command to the following:

cmd = "<orbix_install_dir>\contrib\Cygwin\cpp.exe";

Setting the JDK Location

It is important to set the install location details of your JDK appropriately in the file idlgen.cfg. To do this, edit the Java section of the file idlgen.cfg located in the OrbixOTM config directory.

C++ Wizard Genies

On Win32 platforms, the C++ wizard genies <code>cppwfull.tcl</code> and <code>cppwpre.tcl</code> are incorrectly located in the <code>genies</code> directory. They should be located in a subdirectory of the <code>genies</code> directory called <code>wizards</code>. To rectify this:

- 1. Change directory to IDLgen\genies
- 2. mkdir wizards
- 3. move cppre.tcl wizards
- 4. move cppfull.tcl wizards

Java Genies

For users of the Java genies, the class path is incomplete in the generated makefile. Consequently, you must edit the file <code>gen_makefile.bi</code> located in the following directory

Win32

Edit the file as follows:

1. Add the following to line 171 (which has the ow_ow_JAR definition):

Licensing

You must install the license key supplied in order to use the Orbix Code Generation Toolkit. You can install the key with the executable licence.exe, which is in the bin subdirectory of the OrbixWeb installation directory.

The executable file to be licensed is named idlgen.exe, and can be found in the same directory.

OrbixCOMet Desktop 3.0.1

This section describes OrbixCOMet Desktop 3.0.1.

Development Environments

OrbixCOMet 3.0.1 has been built and tested with Orbix 3.0.1 and OrbixWeb 3.2. This release of OrbixCOMet completely supercedes any previous release of OrbixCOMet.

OrbixCOMet Desktop 3.0.1 is built and tested on Windows NT 4.0, service pack 4, using Microsoft Visual C++ 6.0, with Visual Studio Service Pack 2 applied.

OrbixCOMet Desktop is not supported on versions of Windows NT earlier than 4.0. This is because DCOM is not available on those versions.

OrbixCOMet Desktop supports both the Automation/CORBA mapping and the COM/CORBA mapping as specified in the COM/CORBA Interworking Document (ORBOS-97-09-01).

Automation Clients

Orbix COMet Desktop 3.0.1 has been tested with Automation client applications built with the following:

- PowerSoft PowerBuilder Version 6.0
- Borland Delphi 3/4

When using Delphi4, Inprise recommend that you make a call to Application.Initialise(); before making any COM calls. This includes any calls to OrbixCOMet.

- Microsoft Visual Basic Version 5.0 (SP3)
- Microsoft Visual Basic Version 6.0
- Microsoft Visual C++ 6.0 (SP2)
- Microsoft Excel97
- Microsoft Internet Explorer 4.0 or higher with VBScript

New Features

This section describes new features added to OrbixCOMet 3.0.1.

SSL Support

OrbixCOMet 3.0.1 has been fully integrated with OrbixSSL 3.0. When OrbixSSL 3.0 is installed and SSL support is enabled, OrbixCOMet 3.0.1 supports secure communications using SSL.

OrbixCOMet's new SSL support opens up the domain of SSL-secured CORBA clients and servers to COM/Automation clients and servers. With OrbixCOMet applications using SSL support, all on-the-wire communication using IIOP is secure. Consider the OrbixCOMet recommended deployment scenario of COM/Automation clients or servers using OrbixCOMet in-process and connecting to an SSL-secured CORBA client or server. In this scenario, all on-the-wire communication is performed using SSL-secured IIOP.

This new feature provides OrbixCOMet SSL applications with the cornerstone security attributes of Authentication, Privacy and Integrity with little or no extra code.

The use of secure IIOP between OrbixCOMet and CORBA clients and servers does not have any impact on deployment scenarios where DCOM on-the-wire is also used (that is, where OrbixCOMet is used out-of-process by the COM/Automation clients or servers).

Making OrbixCOMet Applications Secure

SSL support is added to OrbixCOMet applications using a combination of calls to a new OrbixCOMet interface (D)IOrbixSSL and by specifying configuration information in the COMetSSL configuration scope (see OrbixSSL.cfg). In the case of CORBA clients talking to existing DCOM servers, SSL support can be added

using COMetSSL configuration scope settings alone.

The key attribute of an SSL-secured application is its association with an X.509 certificate. A trusted Certificate Authority signs an X.509 certificate. The association between an SSL application and a trusted X.509 Certificate enables authentication of the application. Stored within each certificate is an encrypted private key. A private key is used in conjunction with a public key to facilitate privacy of communication as the private key/public key combination is used to encrypt the messages between the client and server. To retrieve (and decrypt) the private key stored within the certificate requires the use of a private key password.

Hence an application with access to a certificate and the password for the certificate's private key can be initialized as an SSL application. Of course, clients and servers can inspect certificates presented from SSL-enabled applications and reject connection attempts based on custom criteria.

The new OrbixCOMet SSL interface ((D)IOrbixSSL) can be used by COMet applications to specify the password/certificate combination that is to be used to SSL-enable the application. A pointer to the OrbixCOMet SSL interface is obtained by a call to GetOrbixSSL on the existing (D)IOrbixORBObject interface. Applications must then call (D)IOrbixSSL::InitSSL to initialize the SSL library. (See the Demos section below for a list of OrbixCOMet SSL-enabled demos). The process of specifying the private key password/ X.509 certificate combination to be used by the application is achieved by calling (D)IOrbixSSL::SetPrivateKeyPassword and (D)IOrbixSSL:InitScopeSSL.

InitScopeSSL takes as a parameter an IONA configuration scope parameter. For example, objSSL.InitScope("COMetSSL.Demos").

This parameter identifies a scope in the OrbixSSL configuration file that contains a specification of the SSL security policy settings that will be implemented by OrbixSSL on behalf of users of this policy (For reference consult OrbixSSL documentation). If this policy contains a value for the configuration setting IT_CERTIFICATE_FILE, this is the certificate that SSL associates with the application as a result of the call to InitScopeSSL. Scopes and policies can be specified on a per-application basis in the OrbixSSL configuration file. From the following OrbixSSL configuration file excerpt, you can see the specification of the certificate associated with the scope COMELSSL. Demos. All of the OrbixCOMet SSL demos use this scope.

Alternatively, the file specification of the certificate can be passed explicitly as a parameter to the (D)IOrbixSSL:SetSecurityName method.

Note that the password must be specified before the certificate is loaded by the SSL library as a result of a call to InitScopSSL or SetSecurityName. Also, private key passwords should not be "hardcoded" into applications. Instead, where necessary users should be prompted to enter their passwords.

As with all OrbixSSL applications, OrbixCOMet clients and servers are required perform their SSL initialization before either binding to secure CORBA Servers or registering themselves as secure CORBA Servers.

OrbixCOMet SSL Handler DLLs

OrbixCOMet Handler DLLs can be used to inject extra custom SSL functionality into COMet applications. OrbixSSL provides the facility to register a C/C++ callback function that will be invoked by OrbixSSL during client/server authentication. This callback function is passed details of the X.509 certificate of the application being accessed. Custom checks can then be made on the certificate in the implementation of the callback function. If the callback function returns TRUE, this signals the SSL that the certificate is acceptable. If it returns FALSE, OrbixSSL aborts the connection attempt, throwing an authorization failure exception.

This is an example application of OrbixCOMet SSL Handler DLLs that is illustrated in the SSLHandler demo contained in the corbasrv demo directory. This Handler DLL is used by both the secure COM grid client and the secure VB Bank client to check that the certificate used by their respective servers is the demoserver certificate.

Secure CORBA Clients Accessing Existing DCOM Servers

OrbixCOMet SSL support also enables secure CORBA clients to connect to existing DCOM servers (that is, third-party DCOM servers). Currently, OrbixCOMet facilitates CORBA clients connecting to third-party DCOM servers using the OrbixCOMet Generic Custom Surrogate (Custour.exe) which acts, in this scenario, as a CORBA server (see the OrbixCOMet documentation for further details).

If the CORBA client is secure, COMet (hosted by <code>custSur.exe</code>) needs to initialize itself as a secure CORBA server. To instruct an instance of CustSur to initialize itself as a secure CORBA server, the <code>-1</code> switch must be passed to CustSur as a command line parameter.

For example, the current fortune demo CORBA client makefile registers CustSur as a CORBA server with the following command:

```
putit fortune "C:\IONA\COMet_3.0\custsur.exe -t 20000" (-t — specify server time out in milliseconds)
```

To make the fortune server secure simply requires the -1 switch to be added to the command line:

```
putit fortune "C:\IONA\COMet_3.0\custsur.exe -l -t 20000"
```

To run the fortune server persistently, simply add the -1 switch to the command line in addition to the -s switch (required to specify the server name):

```
C:\IONA\COMet_3.0\custsur.exe -l -s "fortune" -t 20000
```

Instructing CustSur to initialize itself as a secure CORBA server does not complete the entire process. CustSur, like any other secure CORBA server, must be associated with an X.509 certificate and have access to the corresponding private key password.

The association between an instance of CustSur — impersonating a particular CORBA server — and a certificate is made using the entries in the COMELSSL.CustSur scope within OrbixSSL.cfg. This scope has entries for each CORBA server that CustSur is set up to impersonate. Each SSL policy within this

scope is identified by the server name. Therefore, for the above example, when CustSur is asked to initialize itself securely as the fortune CORBA server, it looks for a certificate and other SSL security policy configuration information within the configuration scope COMetSSL.CustSur.fortune.

Secure CORBA servers have two options for retrieving passwords at run time. The first is though user input where the server prompts the user to specify the private key password for the certificate when it is launched. Alternatively, the server receives a password from the KDM at start-up time. CustSur supports both methods.

The KDM (Key Distributed Management) is a persistent CORBA server supplied with OrbixSSL (see the OrbixSSL documentation). It provides a mechanism whereby passwords can be securely and dynamically supplied to servers at server start-up time, thereby negating the requirement for user intervention through password entry. The KDM maintains an encrypted database that stores server names and private key password pairs. Entries can be added to the KDM's database using the putkdm CORBA client utility. For example:

```
putKDM fortune demoserverpassword
```

The KDM must be started persistently before the Orbix daemon is started. When the Orbix daemon launches a server, it checks to see if there is an entry for that server in the KDM. If there is, then the password is sent on to the OrbixSSL runtime in the server.

CustSur's SSL initialization code checks to see if it has received a password from the KDM via the Orbix daemon. If no password has been obtained from the KDM (see (D)IOrbixSSL:HasPassword), CustSur displays a dialog prompting the user for a password.

TypeMan and the secure IFR

TypeMan is an IFR client. If the IFR is configured to run as a secure CORBA server, TypeMan needs to operate as a secure CORBA client when it is used to look up type information in the IFR.

To SSL-enable TypeMan, set the OrbixCOMet configuration setting (in config\OrbixCOMet.cfg) to

```
COMet.TypeMan.TYPEMAN_SSL_ENABLED = 'yes' (default is 'no').
```

The X.509 certificate used by TypeMan is specified by the SSL security configuration policy COMetSSL.TypeMan.

OrbixCOMet SSL Demos

Secure Orbix CORBA Grid client/server (demo\corbasrv\ssl_grid).

An SSL-enabled version of the standard C++ grid demo.

Secure Orbix CORBA Bank client/server (demo\corbasrv\ssl_idl_demo).

SSL-enabled version of the standard C++ bank demo.

Visual Basic Bank client (demo\vb\bank).

The existing COMet bank client. This demo can now be initialized as a

secure client by ticking a checkbox.

Used to explicitly specify the file spec of the X.509 certificate to be used by the application. The private key password for an application must be specified before calling SetSecurityName or InitScopeSSL.

Retrieves the file spec of the X.509 certificate being used by the application.

SetPrivateKeyPassword ([in] BSTR cPassword, [in,out] VARIANT

Used to specify the password to be used to decrypt the private key contained within the application's certificate.

HasPassword ([optional,in,out] VARIANT *IT_Ex, [retval,out] VARIANT_BOOL *IT_retval)

OrbixNames 3.0.1and Later Versions

This section describes changes in OrbixNames 3.0.1 and later versions.

Development Environments

Development environment information for OrbixNames 3.0.2 is the same as that described for Orbix 3.0.2 on page 3.

Compatibility with Other IONA Products

It is not possible for OrbixNames 3.0.2 and the Java naming service supplied with OrbixWeb to share the same Bindings Repository.

New Features in OrbixNames 3.0.1and Later Versions

This section describes the new functionality and major changes added in OrbixNames 3.0.1 and later versions.

SSL Support

OrbixNames can now be run securely using OrbixSSL. Before running OrbixNames securely, you must install OrbixSSL and enable SSL support.

-j Switch

The OrbixNames server is a Java application. On platforms other than Solaris, you can instruct the server to pass command-line switches directly to the Java interpreter. To do this, use the <code>-j</code> switch to the OrbixNames server.

For example, if you want to increase the virtual memory used by the interpreter when running OrbixNames, start the server as follows:

ns -j -mx9000000

Documentation

The OrbixNames user documentation has been updated for this release. The OrbixNames user documentation is a single volume, called the *OrbixNames Programmer's and Administrator's Guide*.

Configuration

Each Orbix 3 service has its own configuration file. The OrbixNames configuration variables are scoped and defined in the file orbixnames3.cfg.

Description

The command-line options available with OrbixNames can also be set in orbixnames 3.cfg. The relevant variables are as follows:

The main configuration variable set is described in <code>OrbixNames Programmer's</code> and <code>Administrator's Guide</code>. In addition to these variables, it is now possible when using <code>OrbixNames</code> to configure the format of an IOR, with respect to its host address part. The IOR can contain either the IP address or a host name. The <code>OrbixNames.IT_USE_HOSTNAME_IN_IOR</code> variable determines this characteristic. The default value is <code>TRUE</code>. With this value, a host name appears in an IOR. Setting the value to <code>FALSE</code> causes the IOR to contain an IP address.

Known Problems, Workarounds and Tips

This section describes the known issues and suggested workarounds for OrbixNames 3.0.1 and later versions.

OrbixNames Utilities

The C++ OrbixNames utilities have a switch -h. However this switch does not work. To change the host that is to be used by a utility, explicitly set the desired host value using the variable IT_NAMES_SERVER in the orbixnames3.cfg file.

In addition, you cannot use the utility killit to stop the OrbixNames server when using SSL.

Interoperability Problem

The OrbixNames server assumes the existence of a non-empty principal in IIOP messages received from connecting clients. Some ORBs do not always send principal information from clients. Clients developed using these ORBs fail to connect to the OrbixNames server.

Java Runtime Environment Problem

On HP-UX, you may encounter problems when running the server on a very heavily loaded system. If you are using an old version of the Java Runtime Environment (JRE), the server sometimes crashes. This is due to a problem in the JRE. To work around the problem, pass the -nojit switch to the Java interpreter as follows:

ns -j -nojit

This problem does not occur with version 1.1.6 of the JRE, which is shipped with Orbix 3.0.1 on HP-UX.

Changing the OrbixNames Port Number

The configuration variable IT_NS_PORT in orbixnames3.cfg sets the port number on which applications communicate with the OrbixNames server. This has the same default value as the Orbix daemon port variable IT_DAEMON_PORT. The default is 1570. If you wish to change the OrbixNames port value, set the value of IT_NS_PORT in orbixnames3.cfg.

The IT_NS_PORT value affects only Java applications. In addition, if the Orbix daemon locates the OrbixNames server for your applications, ensure that the value of IT_NS_PORT is the same as IT_DAEMON_PORT. If the OrbixNames server runs without the Orbix daemon, it is not necessary to synchronize these values.

Orbix Wonderwall 3.0.1

This section describes changes made in Orbix Wonderwall 3.0.1.

Licensing

This release of Orbix Wonderwall requires that you license the IIOP proxy with your Orbix 3.0 license key. The installation script attempts to do this. However, if you enter an invalid license key, the proxy will fail at start-up. To enter a new license key, run the following command on UNIX platforms:

The equivalent command on Windows NT is:

Development Environments

Orbix Wonderwall supports the same environments as those described for Orbix on page 3.

To use the GUI tools, you must have either OrbixWeb 3.2 or Orbix 3.0.1 installed. You must also have specified the location of one of these products during installation. If this was not done, you must update the <code>ORBIX_DIR</code> location in your <code>Wonderwall\demo\demo_setup.bat</code> file to point to the root directory of either your Orbix 3.0.1 or OrbixWeb 3.2 installation.

Compatibility

Orbix Wonderwall is designed to interoperate with any CORBA ORB that implements version 1.0 or 1.1 of the CORBA Internet Inter-ORB Protocol (IIOP).

New Features in Orbix Wonderwall 3.0

This section describes the new functionality and major changes added in Orbix Wonderwall 3.0.1.

NT-Specific Changes

Wonderwall on NT is now made up of an executable and two helper DLLs. These DLLs are called the following,

```
iiopproxy301.dll
itts.dll
```

When moving Orbix Wonderwall from its default location, you must ensure that you either keep the DLLs in the same directory as the executable; alternatively, they must be within your path.

SSL-Tagged Component Support in iortool

The iortool utility now has an extra flag that causes it to add an SSL-tagged component to a proxified IOR. The flag is -sslport.

Here is an example of how you might use this feature:

```
iortool -ior -proxify -host bloom -port 16000
    -sslport 3636 \ grid.ior > grid_proxified.ior
```

SSL Details Added to Configuration GUI

The configuration now has an SSL tab that adds configuration details that are relevant for an SSL-enabled Wonderwall.

Incidents Cleared in Orbix Wonderwall 3.0

Known Problems, Workarounds and Tips

This section describes known problems, workarounds, and tips for Orbix Wonderwall 3.0.1.

Fragmented Replies and HTTP Tunneling

Sending fragmented Reply messages from IIOP 1.1 servers over a HTTP-tunneled connection is not yet supported.

Timing Out of Servers with Transformers

If an activated server that requires use of a server transformer times out or is stopped, Orbix Wonderwall attempts to send a transformed message to the server's activation port. This port is associated with the orbixd or orbixdj process and causes the daemon to fail with an unmarshalling error. This in turn causes the server to be unavailable to the client.

Host Names and Orbix 2.3c

Orbix 2.3c does not use the host name in an IOR, but uses the host name contained in the object key instead. If you intend to use Orbix 2.3c clients to contact Orbix or OrbixWeb servers behind Orbix Wonderwall, with proxified IORs, you must run the Wonderwall and server on the same host, but using different ports. This problem is fixed in Orbix 3.0.

Contacting an Unregistered Server

The OrbixWeb 3.0 activator, orbixdj, produces the following stack trace if Orbix Wonderwall tries to bind to a server that is not registered in the Implementation Repository:

```
java.lang.NullPointerException
  at IE.Iona.OrbixWeb.CORBA.ServerRequest.target(ServerRequest.java)
  at IE.Iona.OrbixWeb.Activator.DJAuthenticationFilter.

  at IE.Iona.OrbixWeb.CORBA.BOA.processEvents(BOA.java)
  at IE.Iona.OrbixWeb.CORBA.EventHandler.run(EventHandler.java)

This is fixed in OrbixWeb 3.0 patch 2 and later releases of OrbixWeb.
