Chapter 1 Controlling IOO

This chapter describes how to start and stop IOO, change the IOO environment, and control IOO system intercepts.

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IOO Startup and Shutdown

You can start IOO in two different modes:

Using a persistent address space.

Once IOO startup is complete, the IOO start-up task will go into a wait state and wait for operator commands. The address space created to start IOO will remain active.

Using a transient address space.

Once IOO startup is complete, the IOO start-up task will terminate and the address space will be deleted. IOO itself will remain active.

Follow your installation standards about using persistent or transient address spaces for active products.

Controlling IOO Using a Persistent Address Space

Use the following operator command to start IOO with a persistent address space:

S IO0, OPTIONS={K0|K1|K2|K3|K4|K5}

The OPTIONS parameter identifies to IOO the global options that are to be used. "IOO Start-up Options" on page 10 describes global options K0 through K5.

Use the following operator command to stop IOO:

P I00

Controlling IOO Using a Transient Address Space

Use the following operator command to start IOO with a transient address space:

S IOOINIT,OPTIONS={K0|K1|K2|K3|K4|K5}

The OPTIONS parameter identifies to IOO the global options that are to be used. "IOO Start-up Options" on page 10 describes global options K0 through K5.

Use the following operator command to stop IOO. This command starts the shutdown task:

S IOOSTOP

IOO Start-up Options

The IOO start-up options consist of a 2-character value that you enter with the OPTIONS operand of the IOO JCL procedures as follows:

- JCL procedure IOO (starts IOO and requests that IOO use a persistent address space).
- JCL procedure IOOINIT (starts IOO and requests that IOO use a transient address space).

 JCL procedure IOOMODS (requests that a new start-up option be implemented without having to stop the product).

Examples:

- **1** Starting IOO with an OPTIONS value of K4 will start IOO and authorize it to do the following:
 - Perform non-VSAM reblocking.
 - Use RMODE-31 buffers where possible for both COBOL and non-COBOL programs.
- **2** Starting IOO with an OPTIONS value of K2 will start IOO and authorize it to do the following:
 - Do not perform non-VSAM re-blocking.
 - Use RMODE-31 buffers where possible for both COBOL and non-COBOL programs, and allow the bufferspace for LSR component optimizations to exceed 16 MB.

IOO uses the start-up option that you specify to identify:

The global options table that IOO is to use. The start-up option is appended to the string ULTIGB to form the 8-character module name of the global options table that IOO will load from the load library that you specify in the STEPLIB DD statement of the IOO, IOOINIT, or IOOMOD procedures. The global options table may be one of the ones distributed with IOO (as identified in the table below) or it may identify a user-customized table.



NOTE Appendix A, "Rules Tables" described how to create a customized global options table if the options table that is shipped with StarTool IOO does not satisfy your needs.

 The DCF rules table that IOO is to use. The start-up option is appended to the string DCF to form the 5-character name of the member containing the DCF rules that IOO is to use. This member must reside in the JCL library. The member may be one of the ones distributed with IOO or it may identify a user-customized set of DCF rules.

For example, if startup option K3 is specified, IOO will attempt to use global options table ULTIGBK3 and DCF rules member DCFK3.

Global Options Tables Distributed with IOO

The following members of the STRIOO.VvRrMm.LOAD library identify the global options tables that are associated with the IOO start-up options:

Changing the IOO Environment

Once IOO has been successfully started, IOO will maintain the requested environment until it is modified. IOO supports two types of environment modification:

- Changing the global options (see "Changing the Global Options" on page 12).
- Changing the DCF rules (see "Changing the DCF Rules" on page 13).

Changing the Global Options

You can modify the global options used by IOO by doing one of the following:

- By stopping IOO (with the appropriate shutdown command as described in "IOO Startup and Shutdown" on page 10) and then restarting IOO with the desired global option.
- By using the IOOMODS JCL procedure to load and activate the new global option. You can start the IOOMODS JCL procedure with the following operator command:

S IOOMODS,OPTIONS={K0|K1|K2|K3|K4|K5}

The OPTIONS parameter identifies to IOO the global option that is to be used.

The IOOMODS JCL procedure will cause the DCF rules that correspond to the selected global option to be activated.

Changing the DCF Rules

The Dynamic Control Facility (DCF) rules are loaded each time that IOO is started and each time that the IOOMODS JCL procedure is used to load and activate new global options.

You can also take one of the following actions to load DCF rules:

- Issue the following operator command:
 - S IOODCF,DCFIN='dsn'

where *dsn* is the name of the data set with the DCF input. The IOODCF JCL procedure will replace the existing DCF rules with those loaded from the specified data set. For example:

```
S IOODCF, DCFIN='STRIOO.VvRrMm.JCL(DCFK3)'
```

specifies that DCF input is to be taken from the STRIOO.VvRrMm.JCL(DCFK3) data set.

 From within the DCF ISPF interface, select option 3 on the main panel (panel DCF001). On the resulting panel (panel DCF009), enter the name of the data set containing the desired DCF rules. Press Enter and IOO will submit the command to activate the specified rules.

The DCF is described in detail in Chapter 3, "Dynamic Control Facility".

Controlling the IOO System Intercepts

To successfully process each access to a data set, IOO intercepts selected SVCs. Enter the following command to deactivate the IOO intercepts:

F IOO,OFF

Note that this command will disable the IOO intercepts; it will neither remove nor delete them.

Enter the following operator command to reactivate the IOO intercepts:

F IOO,ON

Displaying IOO Status

You can display the processing status of IOO at any time by typing the following operator command on the system console:

S IOOINQY{,OCLS=A}

The optional OCLS parameter identifies the output class.

Dynamic Memory Management (DMM) Considerations

At data set OPEN time StarTool IOO analyzes the potential region size for both 24- and 31-bit storage. Taking into account Local System Queue Area (LSQA) requirements, IOO dynamically maximizes region limits to give executing programs access to as much storage as possible.

In maximizing region limits, IOO uses the values of the following keyword operands from the IOO global table:

Global Table Keyword Operand	Description
ELIMIT=	DMM: Limit value > 16MB
IEALIMIT=	DMM: Limit value < 16MB
EREGION=	DMM: Region size > 16MB
REGNHWM=	DMM: Region size < 16MB
LSQA=	DMM's LSQA reserved amount
LSQALEXT=	DMM's LSQA minimum contiguous space

If SETRGN=YES is specified in the global table source or GBT SETRGN=YES is specified in the DCF input (indicating that the DMM feature is to be activated), two actions are required:

1. Define a facility to RACF with a discrete profile name of your own choosing as follows:

```
RDEFINE FACILITY profilename ACC(NONE)
```

2. Update the global table source to set the FACILITY keyword to the name of the profile specified in the REDEFINE above:

FACILITY=profilename

The default value for *profilename* is \$SERENA.IOO.DMM.

When you start StarTool IOO, and SETRGN=YES is specified in the global table source or GBT SETRGN=YES is specified in the DCF input, IOO will ask RACF if the facility profile name specified by the FACILITY keyword exists. If the profile does exist, DMM will be activated. If the profile does not exist DMM will not be activated.

To see the effect of DMM, you can run a job that qualifies for IOO optimization with the following JCL statement:

//SZITRDMM DD DUMMY

Refer to Appendix A, "Rules Tables" on page 79 for more information about global table operands.

Chapter 2 Controlling a Job within IOO

This chapter describes how to bypass optimization, request optimization, and force the use of a specific optimization rule.

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Bypassing Optimization

IOO provides two ways to bypass optimization:

- With Dynamic Control Facility (DCF) rules (see "Bypassing Optimization with DCF" on page 16).
- With the execution JCL (see "Bypassing Optimization with JCL" on page 18).

Bypassing Optimization with DCF

IOO will bypass the optimization of a data set when the selected DCF rule requests the bypassing of the desired IOO component. The selected DCF rule will be the first DCF rule that matches all coded criteria.

For example, given the following DCF rules:

BYPASS=ALL PGM=TEST7	Rule #1
BYPASS=ALL DD=SYSUT2	Rule #2
SELECT=ALL JOB=MYJOB1	Rule #3

Note the following results:

- Any job executing program TEST7 will be bypassed from optimization by rule #1. No additional DCF rules will be searched. Thus, a job named MYJOB1 would be bypassed from optimization when it executes program TEST7 even though there is a select rule for the job in rule #3. IOO will not process rule #3 because it has already matched rule #1.
- Any data set accessed with DDname SYSUT2 will be bypassed from optimization by rule #2. No additional DCF rules will be searched. Thus, a job named MYJOB1 would be bypassed from optimization when it accesses DDname SYSUT2 even though there is a select rule for the job in rule #3. IOO will not process rule #3 because it has already matched rule #2.
- Job MYJOB1 will be selected for optimization by rule #3 except when:
 - It executes program TEST7 (in which case it will be bypassed when IOO matches rule #1).
 - It accesses DDname SYSUT2 (in which case it will be bypassed when IOO matches rule #2).

To request the bypassing of optimization with the DCF rules, either:

 A new rule containing sufficient criteria to identify the optimization to be bypassed must be added to the DCF rules (prior to any select rule whose selection criteria would match).

or:

• An existing DCF bypass rule must be updated such that it contains the needed criteria.

In both cases, you should use the DCF ISPF interface to update the DCF rules.

Scope of the Bypass

The scope of the bypass will depend in part upon the selection criteria that you identify. All specified selection criteria must be matched for the DCF rule to be selected.

Example #1

If you specify both a job name and a DDname (as in the following rule):

```
BYPASS=ALL
JOB=MYJOB1
DD=SYSUT2
```

both criteria must be matched for the DCF rule to be selected. In this case, DDname SYSUT2 will be bypassed only when it is accessed by job MYJOB1. DDname SYSUT2 will be optimized if any other job accesses it. Any other DDname will be optimized if job MYJOB1 accesses it.

Example #2

If you want to bypass all optimizations for any job named TEST37 (no matter what data set is accessed or what step is involved), code only the job name as the selection criteria:

BYPASS=ALL JOB=TEST37

This is an example of a job-level bypass.

Example #3

If you want to bypass all optimizations for step STEP6 within job TEST37 (no matter what data set is accessed), code the job name and the step name as the selection criteria:

```
BYPASS=ALL
JOB=TEST37
STEP=STEP6
```

This is an example of a step-level bypass. If the job name were not specified in the DCF rule, IOO would select the rule for any step name STEP6, no matter what job name was used.

Example #4

If you want to bypass all optimizations for data set PAYROLL.BACKUP (no matter where it is accessed):

BYPASS=ALL DSN=PAYROLL.BACKUP

This is an example of a system-level bypass (for the indicated data set).

Updating the DCF Input Data

Refer to "Starting the ISPF Interface to DCF" on page 27 for specific instructions on starting the DCF ISPF interface.

Refer to "Command/Option 1: Insert a Rule into the Start of an IOO-DCF Table" on page 29 for specific instructions on defining a single new rule and inserting it in front of any existing rules.

Refer to "Command/Option 2: Maintain an IOO-DCF Table" on page 39 for specific instructions on updating an existing rule within the DCF rules.

Bypassing Optimization with JCL

IOO provides several ways to bypass optimization with JCL. Optimization can be bypassed for an entire job, an entire step, or selected DDnames.

Requesting a Job-Level Bypass

Change the job name to one having one of the following prefixes:

- NOIOO
- NOSIO
- NOULT

This will bypass optimization for the entire job.

Requesting a Step-Level Bypass

There are two ways to accomplish this:

- 1 Change the step name to one having one of the following prefixes
 - NOIOO
 - NOSIO
 - NOULT

This will bypass optimization for the entire step.

2 Add the DD_SOFF DDname to the step JCL. For example, if the default value of ULT@SOFF was taken for the DD_SOFF global table value, adding the following DD statement to the step JCL will cause the bypassing of optimization for the entire step:

//ULT@SOFF DD DUMMY

NOTE ULT@SOFF is the default DDname that is shipped for the global table DD_SOFF operand. See "DCF IOO Global Table Override Records" on page 48 for more information about the DD_SOFF operand.

Requesting a Selective Bypass

To bypass IOO optimization for only a portion of a step, insert the DD_OFF DDname into the step JCL at the point you wish to turn off optimization. In the following example, assume that the default value of ULT@OFF was taken for the DD_OFF global table value:

//S010	EXEC	PGM=MYPROG
//IN001	DD	DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.INPUT.FILE1
//ULT@OFF	DD	DUMMY
//OUT01	DD	DISP=SHR, DSN=MY.OUTPUT.FILE1

//OUT02 DD DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.OUTPUT.FILE2



NOTE ULT@OFF is the default DDname that is shipped for the global table DD_OFF operand. See "DCF IOO Global Table Override Records" on page 48 for more information about the DD_OFF operand.

Because DD statement IN001 falls outside the domain of any IOO DDname (it precedes the ULT@OFF DDname in the JCL), optimization of it depends upon the presence of a matching DCF SELECT rule. If no matching DCF rule is found, optimization is not performed.

Because DD statements OUT01 and OUT02 both fall within the domain of an IOO DD_OFF DDname, IOO would bypass optimization for both.

Requesting Optimization

IOO provides two ways to request optimization:

- With Dynamic Control Facility (DCF) rules (see "Requesting Optimization with DCF" on page 19).
- With the execution JCL (see "Requesting Optimization with JCL" on page 21).

Requesting Optimization with DCF

IOO will select the optimization of a data set when the selected DCF rule requests the selection of the desired IOO component. The selected DCF rule will be the first DCF rule matching all coded criteria.

For example, given the following DCF rules:

SELECT=ALL PGM=TEST7	Rule #1
SELECT=ALL DD=SYSUT2	Rule #2
BYPASS=ALL JOB=MYJOB1	Rule #3

Note the following results:

- Rule #1 will select any job that executes program TEST7 for optimization. No additional DCF rules will be searched. For example, a job named MYJOB1 would be selected for optimization when it executes program TEST7 even though there is a bypass rule for the job in rule #3. IOO will not process rule #3 because it has already matched rule #1.
- Rule #2 will select any job that accesses any data set with DDname SYSUT2 for optimization. No additional DCF rules will be searched. For example, a job named MYJOB1 would be selected for optimization when it accesses DDname SYSUT2 even though there is a bypass rule for the job in rule #3. IOO will not process rule #3 because it has already matched rule #2.
- Rule #3 will bypass MYJOB1 from optimization except when:

- It executes program TEST7 (in which case it will be selected when IOO matches rule #1).
- It accesses DDname SYSUT2 (in which case it will be selected when IOO matches rule #2).

To request the selection of optimization with the DCF rules, either:

 A new rule containing sufficient criteria to identify the optimization to be selected must be added to the DCF rules (prior to any bypass rule whose selection criteria would match).

Or:

 An existing DCF SELECT rule must be updated such that it contains the needed criteria.

In both cases, you should use the ISPF interface to DCF to update the DCF rules.

Scope of the Select

The scope of the select will depend in part upon the selection criteria that you identify. All specified selection criteria must be matched for the DCF rule to be selected.

Example #1

If you specify both a job name and a DDname (as in the following rule):

```
SELECT=ALL
JOB=MYJOB1
DD=SYSUT2
```

both criteria must be matched for the DCF rule to be selected. In this case, only DDname SYSUT2 will be selected when it is accessed by job MYJOB1. When any other job accesses DDname SYSUT2, it will not match this rule. When MYJOB1 accesses any other DDname, it will not match this rule.

Example #2

If you want to optimize everything for a job named TEST37 (no matter what data set is accessed or what step is involved), code only the job name as the selection criteria:

SELECT=ALL JOB=TEST37

This is an example of job-level optimization.

Example #3

If you want optimize everything for step STEP6 within job TEST37 job (no matter what data set is accessed) code the job name and the step name as the selection criteria:

```
SELECT=ALL
JOB=TEST37
STEP=STEP6
```

This is an example of step-level optimization.

Note that if the job name were not specified in the DCF rule, IOO would select the rule for any step name STEP6 no matter what job name was used.

Example #4

If you want to optimize all accesses of data set PAYROLL.BACKUP (no matter where it is accessed), code the following as selection criteria:

SELECT=ALL DSN=PAYROLL.BACKUP

This is an example of system-level optimization (for the indicated data set).

Updating the DCF Input Data

Refer to "Starting the ISPF Interface to DCF" on page 27 for specific instructions on starting the ISPF interface to DCF.

Refer to "Command/Option 1: Insert a Rule into the Start of an IOO-DCF Table" on page 29 for specific instructions on defining a single new rule and inserting it in front of any existing rules.

Refer to "Command/Option 2: Maintain an IOO-DCF Table" on page 39 for specific instructions on updating an existing rule within the DCF rules.

Requesting Optimization with JCL

IOO provides several ways to request optimization with JCL. You can request optimization for:

- An entire job (see "Requesting Job-Level Optimization" on page 21).
- An entire step (see "Requesting Step-Level Optimization" on page 21).
- Selected DDnames within a step (see "Requesting a Selective Optimization" on page 22).

Requesting Job-Level Optimization

Changing the job name to one having one of the following prefixes will select optimization for the entire job:

- IOO
- ULT

Requesting Step-Level Optimization

There are two ways to accomplish step-level optimization:

- 1 Change the step name to one having one of the following prefixes:
 - IOO
 - ULT
- 2 Add the DD_SON DDname to the step JCL. For example, if the default value of ULT@SON was taken for the DD_SON global table value, addition of the following DD statement to the step JCL will optimize the entire step:

//ULT@SON DD DUMMY



NOTE ULT@SON is the default DDname that is shipped for the global table DD_SON operand. See "DCF IOO Global Table Override Records" on page 48 for more information about the DD_SON operand.

Requesting a Selective Optimization

To select IOO optimization for only a portion of a step, insert the DD_ON DDname into the step JCL at the point you wish to turn on optimization. In the following example, assume that the default value of ULT@ON was taken for the DD_ON global table value:

//S010	EXEC	PGM=MYPROG
//IN001	DD	DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.INPUT.FILE1
//ULT@ON	DD	DUMMY
//OUT01	DD	DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.OUTPUT.FILE1
//OUT02	DD	DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.OUTPUT.FILE2



NOTE ULT@ON is the default DDname that is shipped for the global table DD_ON operand. See "DCF IOO Global Table Override Records" on page 48 for more information about the DD_ON operand.

Because DD statement IN001 falls outside the domain of any IOO DDname (it precedes the ULT@OFF DDname in the JCL), optimization of it depends upon the presence of a matching DCF SELECT rule. If no matching DCF rule is found, optimization is not performed.

Because DD statements OUT01 and OUT02 both fall within the domain of an IOO DD_ON DDname, IOO would select both for optimization.

Forcing the Use of a Specific Optimization Rule

Sometimes it is desirable to force IOO to use specific optimization parameters. For example, for a VSAM data set you may wish to either force the use of Local Shared Resources (LSR) or force the use of Non-Shared Resources (NSR).

You can force the use of a specific optimization rule with DCF or JCL.

Forcing a Specific Optimization Rule with DCF

To force the use of a specific optimization rule, a RULE override must be added to the matching DCF rule. Because the optimization rule specified by the override will be used by all files matching the selected DCF rule, the DCF rule should be as granular as possible.

For example, given the following DCF rule:

```
SELECT=ALL
JOB=MYJOB1
RULE=VSMLSR31
```

IOO will attempt to use optimization rule VSMLSR31 for all files accessed by job MYJOB1 (whether the file is VSAM or not).

Use the ISPF interface to DCF to either define or update a SELECT rule that uniquely identifies the file in question. Include in the DCF rule a RULE override specifying the desired optimization rule.

The following field in panel DCF003 is where the name of the desired optimization rule should be entered:

Name of rule table entry to select ==> _

Position the cursor to the input area and press <PF1> to see a list of the provided rules.

"Starting the ISPF Interface to DCF" on page 27 contains instructions on starting the ISPF DCF interface.

"Command/Option 1: Insert a Rule into the Start of an IOO-DCF Table" on page 29 contains instructions on inserting a single new rule in front of any existing DCF rules.

"Command/Option 2: Maintain an IOO-DCF Table" on page 39 contains instructions on updating existing DCF rules.

Forcing a Specific Optimization Rule with JCL

IOO uses two special DDnames to identify situations where a specific IOO rule has been requested for a file.

A DD statement having a DDname in the format of SZIRULEx (where x is any valid EBCDIC character) instructs IOO that a request is being made for a specific optimization rule. The DDname on the next DD statement will be used as the name of the optimization rule. The DD statement after that is the target DD statement.

For example:

//S010	EXEC	PGM=MYPROG	
//SZIRULE1	DD	DUMMY	< See note #1
//VSMLSR31	DD	DUMMY	< See note #1
//INFILE	DD	DISP=SHR,VSAM.FILE1	< See note #1
//SZIRULE\$	DD	DUMMY	< See note #2
//VSMNSR24	DD	DUMMY	< See note #2
//OUTFILE	DD	DISP=SHR,VSAM.FILE2	< See note #2

 Note 1: The SZIRULE1 DDname instructs IOO that the DDname from the next DD statement (VSMLSR31) is to be used as the name of the optimization rule when the next DD statement (DDname INFILE) is optimized. When DDname INFILE is opened, IOO will use optimization rule VSMLSR31 and DDname INFILE will be optimized using VSAM Local Shared Resources with RMODE 31 buffers.



NOTE See "Criteria Records" on page 50 for more information about the VSMLSR31 operand of the RULE= criteria record.

 Note 2: The SZIRULE\$ DDname instructs IOO that the DDname from the next DD statement (VSMNSR24) is to be used as the name of the optimization rule when the next DD statement (DDname OUTFILE) is optimized. When DDname OUTFILE is opened, IOO will use optimization rule VSMNSR24 and DDname OUTFILE will be optimized using VSAM Non-Shared Resources with RMODE 24 buffers.



NOTE See "Criteria Records" on page 50 for more information about the VSMLSR24 operand of the RULE= criteria record.

Chapter 3 Dynamic Control Facility

The Dynamic Control Facility (DCF) is an ISPF interface to IOO that allows you to easily control how and when IOO optimizes access to files.

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Overview

During IOO startup, IOO reads the specified DCF input stream and creates a table of rules that will identify file accesses that are to be either selected for IOO optimization or bypassed from IOO optimization (based upon the selection criteria included in the DCF rules).

Once IOO optimization has been selected by a DCF rule, IOO searches the optimization rules table to find a rule containing suitable optimization parameters for that access. Individual optimization parameters within the selected optimization rule will be overridden by any corresponding override value provided in the DCF rule.

DCF rules are processed on a first-match basis. That is, DCF will accept the first matching rule that is found. For example, given the following DCF definitions:

SELECT=ALL	<	Rule	#1
JOB=MYJOB1			
BYPASS=ALL	<	Rule	#2
JOB=MYJOB1			
STEP=STEP1			

If job MYJOB1 were to access a data set in step STEP1, the data set would be selected for optimization by IOO (even though a bypass rule for that step exists in rule #2) because IOO would match the criteria in rule #1 and would not process rule #2.

In order to bypass processing for step STEP1 for job MYJOB1, the DCF rules should be coded as follows:

```
BYPASS=ALL <--- Rule #1
JOB=MYJOB1
STEP=STEP1
SELECT=ALL <--- Rule #2
JOB=MYJOB1
```

The ISPF Interface to DCF

The ISPF interface to DCF allows a user to perform the following activities:

- Customize the appearance of the DCF panels.
- Insert an IOO-DCF bypass/select rule into the start of a DCF definition file. The
 operations staff can use this feature to quickly select or bypass the use of IOO.
- Maintain an IOO-DCF table. The interface will allow a user to interactively update an existing DCF file. Existing DCF rules can be edited, deleted, or replicated. New rules can be added. The resultant DCF rules can be written to either back to the original input file or to a different output file.
- Activate a set of DCF definitions.

Using Online Help

You can request panel-level help for any DCF panel by placing the cursor anywhere on the panel and pressing PF1.

You can request field-level help for any field on any DCF panel by placing the cursor in the data entry area for the field and pressing PF1.

Starting the ISPF Interface to DCF

Take the follow actions to start the ISPF interface to DCF:

1 On ISPF screen 6, issue the command **IOODCF**.

DCF Input

DCF input is supplied to IOO at two different times:

- Through DDname ULTIDCF during IOO start-up time. IOO will parse the DCF input stream and load its contents into memory.
- During DCF maintenance processing when an ISPF user updates a DCF input stream. The DCF input stream is identified to IOO through the data set name that the ISPF user enters on panel DCF001.

The DCF input stream consists of:

- DCF rule definition records (see "DCF Rule Definition Records" on page 47).
- IOO global table override records (see "DCF IOO Global Table Override Records" on page 48).

DCF Rule Definition Records

You use the ISPF interface to DCF to build and maintain DCF rule definitions. DCF rule definitions consist of one or more sets of records. Each set of records defines a DCF rule by means of the following record types:

- Up to 10 lines of comments that describe the rule being defined (optional).
- One or more Scope records that define the IOO optimization components to be selected or rejected by the rule (required).
- One or more Criteria records that define elements that must be matched by an application's access to a data set for the DCF rule to apply (required).
- One or more override records that identify data elements to be overridden in the IOO optimization rule that IOO selects for this data set (required).

The records are maintained by the ISPF interface to DCF in the same order listed above (for example, the Scope records precede the Criteria records and so on).

The DCF input stream will consist of multiple sets of these records, each defining a different DCF rule.

DCF IOO Global Table Override Records

The ISPF interface to DCF can also, optionally, maintain overrides for IOO global options. While these override records can be placed anywhere within the DCF input stream (even within the middle of a DCF rule definition), they will be moved to the end of the DCF input stream when the ISPF interface to DCF encounters them.

General Rule Coding Guidelines

NOTE We recommend that you use the ISPF interface to DCF to maintain DCF data. You should use the native ISPF edit function only in special circumstances. The DCF rule definition coding rules and formats provided in this manual describe DCF output, which you can use as a guide if you need to maintain DCF data with the ISPF edit function.

General DCF coding rules are as follows:

- DCF rule definition records can start anywhere within record positions 1-66.
- Embedded blanks within coded values are not supported. IOO ignores any record that contains a blank in record positions 1-66 and the ISPF interface to DCF deletes the record.
- Both uppercase and lowercase values are permitted.
- Only one operand can be coded per input record.

Comment Records

A Comment record begins with an asterisk character (*) in the first byte of the record. Up to 10 comment records can be included for a DCF rule definition.

Scope Records

Scope records identify the components that are to be either selected or bypassed by the DCF rule. Scope records must be coded as follows:

Scope Record	Description
SELECT=(IOO_component_list)	Identifies the IOO components that will be selected if the DCF rule is matched.
BYPASS=(IOO_component_list)	Identifies the IOO components that will be bypassed if the DCF rule is matched.

See "Rules for Coding the Component List" on page 49 for rules on coding the component list.

Rules for Coding the Component List

The IOO component list identifies the IOO components whose selection or rejection is being defined by the DCF rule. Rules for coding the component list are:

- If more that one IOO component is to be identified, enclose the list of components in parentheses and separate the components by commas.
- If a single IOO component is to be identified, the use of parentheses is optional.
- Multiple Scope records can be coded for the same rule.
- The coding of ALL for a SELECT statement will remove any previously identified BYPASS requests. Conversely, the coding of ALL for a BYPASS statement will remove any previously identified SELECT requests.

The following component list values are supported:

Value	Description
ALL	The rule applies to all IOO components.
IOO-Block	The rule applies to the IOO non-VSAM reblocking and rebuffering component.
IOO-LSR	The rule applies to the IOO LSR component.
IOO-VSAM	The rule applies to the IOO VSAM component.

The following values are considered obsolete but will be supported as indicated during IOO startup. If they are encountered by the ISPF interface to DCF, they will be upgraded to the newer values.

Value	Description
IOO-SAM	IOO startup treats this value as IOO-Block.
Ulti-Block	IOO startup treats this value as IOO-Block.
Ulti-SAM	IOO startup treats this value as IOO-Block.
Ulti-LSR	IOO startup treats this value as IOO-LSR.
Ulti-VSAM	IOO startup treats this value as IOO-VSAM.

The following values are no longer supported. If IOO startup encounters them, they will be ignored. If the ISPF interface to DCF encounters them, they will be deleted from the DCF input stream.

Value	Description
IOO-IMS	Not supported.

Examples

BYPASS=ALL	All IOO components are to be bypassed by the rule.

Criteria Records

Criteria records identify the elements that must be matched for IOO to apply the rule to the data set being accessed. The following Criteria records are supported. Code the desired rule name and include optimization rule overrides for any values you wish to change:

Criteria Record	Description
JOB=	Identifies a job name to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.
STEP=	Identifies a step name to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.
JSTEP=	Identifies a job-step name that invokes a JCL procedure to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.
PGM=	Identifies a program name to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.
DD=	Identifies a DDname to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.
DSN=	Identifies a DSN (data set name) to be used as match criteria for the DCF rule.

Criteria Record	Description		
RULE=	Identifies the name of the optimization rule that is to be used (should the remaining Criteria records cause selection of the DCF rule). If no RULE= Criteria record is provided, IOO will search for the appropriate optimization rule. IOO provides the following optimization rule names for use with this operand:

Coding notes:

 All Criteria records except RULE support the use of the asterisk (*) as a variablelength wildcard character.

- All Criteria records except RULE support the use of the questions mark (?) as a fixedlength wildcard character.
- All coded Criteria records must be matched for the DCF rule to be selected.
- Only one of each type of Criteria record should be coded for each DCF rule. While this
 rule is now enforced by the ISPF interface to DCF, the similar-criteria feature of DCF
 still allows the coding of multiple criteria of the same type within a single DCF rule
 group when the DCF input is processed during IOO startup.
- The similar-criteria feature of DCF states that if IOO encounters two identical criteria types within the domain of the same Scope record, IOO will replicate the current rule and apply the new criteria to the new rule.

For example, the following single rule:

SELECT=ALL JOB=JOBNAME1 DD=DDNAME1 JOB=JOBNAME2 DD=DDNAME2

will be resolved into the following three rules:

```

```

SELECT=ALL JOB=JOBNAME2 DD=DDNAME2

IOO startup will resolve and honor any DCF input that is coded to use the similar-criteria feature of DCF, and the ISPF interface to DCF will convert that input into discreet rules. This behavior allows for the easy conversion of existing DCF data.

Examples of Wildcard Use

With the fixed-length ? wildcard character, one and only one character (of any value) must be present. In the following example:

JOB=MYJOB?

- MYJOB1 would match. The ? is replaced with 1.
- MYJOB2 would match. The ? is replaced with 2.
- MYJOB would fail due to no replacement character.
- MYJOB21 would fail due to the presence of too many replacement characters.

With the variable-length * wildcard character any number of characters (including no characters) can be present. In the following example:

DD=SYS*1

• SYSUT1 would match. The * is replaced with UT.

- SYSUT21 would match. The * is replaced with UT2.
- SYS1 would match. The * is replaced with a null.
- SYS11 would match. The * is replaced with 1.
- SYSUT21A would fail because of the A suffix.
- SYSUT2 would fail because of no suffix of 1.

Multiple Rule Example

Given the following three sets of DCF input:

Select all IOO components for DDname SYSUT1 when it is processed by job MYJOB1:

SELECT=I00-VSAM
JOB=TESTV1
STEP=STEP1
RULE=VSMLSR31
```

and

Bypass all other jobs:

BYPASS=ALL JOB=ALL

The following would occur:

- Any data set accessed via DDname SYSUT1 by a job named MYJOB1 would be selected for optimization by the first DCF rule and would search the optimization rules table for the needed optimization parameters.
- Any data set accessed via DDname SYSUT2 by the same job would match the third DCF rule and would not be selected for optimization.
- Any data set accessed within step STEP1 of a job named TESTV1 would match the second DCF rule and would be selected for optimization. Rule VSMLSR31 (within the optimization rules table) would be used for the optimization parameters.
- Any data set accessed by a job named PROD1 would match the third DCF rule and would not be selected for optimization by IOO.

Optimization Rule Override Records

Override records identify parameters in the selected optimization rule that are to be overridden when the current DCF rule is matched. There are three categories of override records:

- Non-VSAM override records. (See "Non-VSAM Override Records" on page 54 for a description of each non-VSAM override record.)
- VSAM override records. (See "VSAM Override Records" on page 55 for a description of each VSAM override record.)
- Common override records (See "Common Override Records" on page 61 for a description of each common override record.). Common override records apply to both VSAM and non-VSAM processing.

Non-VSAM Override Records

The non-VSAM override records are:

- BLKSIZE
- BUFNO
- FLAGS
- LBI_BLKSIZE

These override records are described in the following sections.

BLKSIZE=value{K|KB}

The BLKSIZE override record identifies the target blocksize that IOO will use when optimizing a data set's blocksize. Coding rules are:

- The value cannot exceed 32767.
- A value of zero will bypass the use of the optimization rule table blocksize. The blocksize will instead be extracted from the IOO device table.
- Suffixes of K and KB are supported.

Examples:

Example	Meaning
BLKSIZE=8000	Request a blocksize of 8000.
BLKSIZE=8K	Request a blocksize of 8192.

BUFNO=value

The BUFNO override record identifies the target value that IOO is to use when optimizing a data set's buffer count. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 255.
- A value of 0 will cause the buffer count to not be optimized.
- If BUFNO and LBI_BLKSIZE are both specified:
 - The BUFNO value will be applied to Large Block Interface (LBI) optimizations only (blocksizes of 32KB and above).
 - Non-LBI optimizations (blocksizes less than 32KB) will use the buffer count extracted from the optimization rule.
- If BUFNO is specified without LBI_BLKSIZE:

- The BUFNO value will be applied to non-LBI optimizations only (blocksizes of 32KB and above).
- Since LBI_BLKSIZE was not coded, no LBI optimizations will be performed for the rule.

Examples:

Example	Meaning
BUFNO=32	Request 32 buffers (non-LBI).
BUFNO=24 BLKSIZE=4096	Request 24 buffers (non-LBI).
BUFNO=16 LBI_BLKSIZE=46K	Request 16 buffers (LBI).

FLAGS=(options)

The FLAGS override record identifies additional IOO optimization options. The supported value for non-VSAM, LBI optimizations only is:

FLAGS=(ALCBUF31)

This record directs IOO to request that the buffers can be allocated from RMODE31 storage.

LBI_BLKSIZE=value{K|KB}

The LIB_BLKSIZE override record defines the target blocksize that IOO will use when reblocking a data set that can use the Large Block Interface (LBI). Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 256KB.
- A value of 0 will cause the LBI blocksize not to be optimized.
- Suffixes of K and KB are supported, but optional.

Examples:

Example	Meaning
LBI_BLKSIZE=40000	Request a blocksize of 40,000.
LBI_BLKSIZE=128KB	Request a blocksize of 131,072.

VSAM Override Records

The VSAM override records are:

- BIAS
- BUFND
- BIFNI
- BUFSP
- DMSHWM

- DSIZEMX
- FLAGS
- ISIZEMX
- VSI

These override records are described in the following sections.

BIAS={DIR|DYN|SEQ}

The BIAS override record identifies the bias to be used when NSR buffers are allocated. The BIAS record can be used when an application defines a file's access one way, but actually accesses it using a different mode. The following three values are supported:

Value	Meaning
BIAS=DIR	IOO will bias the buffer allocation in favor of direct (random) access by the application. IOO will attempt to allocate enough index buffers to keep as many non-sequence-set records as possible in storage. IOO will ensure there are enough data buffers to satisfy the declared string count.
BIAS=DYN	IOO will bias the buffer allocation in favor of dynamic (random and sequential) access by the application. IOO will attempt to allocate enough index buffers to keep as many non-sequence-set records as possible in storage. IOO will attempt to allocate up to one Control Area (CA) of data buffers.
BIAS=SEQ	IOO will bias the buffer allocation in favor of sequential access by the application. IOO will ensure there are enough index buffers to satisfy the declared string count. IOO will attempt to allocate up to one Control Area (CA) of data buffers.

Example:

Example	Meaning
BIAS=SEQ	Request buffers be allocated with a bias toward sequential processing.

BUFND=value{K|KB}

The BUFND override record identifies the target data component buffer count for NSR optimizations. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 32767.
- A value of zero will cause the override to be ignored. The value in the selected optimization rule will be used.
- Suffixes of K and KB are supported, but optional.

Example:

Example	Meaning
BUFND=512	Request 512 data buffers.

BUFNI=value{K|KB}

The BUFNI override record identifies the target index component buffer count for NSR optimizations. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 32767.
- A value of zero will cause the override to be ignored. The value in the selected optimization rule will be used.
- Suffixes of K and KB are supported, but optional.

Example:

Example	Meaning
BUFNI=128	Request 128 data buffers.

BUFSP=value{K|KB|M|MB}

The BUFSP override record identifies the target bufferspace to be used for NSR optimizations. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 134,217,728 (128MB).
- A value of zero will cause the override to be ignored. The value in the selected optimization rule will be used.
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB are supported, but optional. If you omit the suffix, the specified value in bytes is used. For example:
 - 128K means 128 kilobytes.
 - 128MB means 128 megabytes.
 - 128 means 128 bytes.

Example:

Example	Meaning
BUFNI=2MB	Request 2MB of NSR buffers.

DMSHWM=(count,percent)

The DMSHWM override record identifies the threshold (high-water-mark) values for the Dynamic Mode Selection (DMS) feature. For an LSR file, if the number of consecutive sequential requests exceeds the threshold value determined by IOO, IOO will close the data set and reopen it using NSR optimization.

- The *count* value refers to an absolute number of consecutive sequential requests.
- The *percent* value refers to the percentage of allocated buffers.
- The threshold value used by IOO depends upon the global DMS option as follows:
 - If the global DMS options is set to MIN (the default value), the minimum of the two values will be used as the threshold.
 - If the global DMS options is set to MAX, the maximum of the two values will be used as the threshold.

For example, assume that DMSHWM=(12, 10) is coded in the selected DCF rule and that a data set selected for optimization by that rule is given 1024 data buffers (10 percent of which is a value of 102).

If DMS=MIN was defaulted in the global table, IOO would use a value of 12 (the minimum of the absolute count of 12 and the computed percent of 102) as the DMS threshold. Thus, when the application program issued its 13th consecutive sequential request, DMS would attempt to close the data set and reopen it using NSR optimization.

If DMS=MAX was coded to in the global table, IOO would use a value of 102 (the maximum of the absolute count of 12 and the computed percent of 102) as the DMS threshold. Thus, when the application program issued its 103rd consecutive sequential request, DMS would attempt to close the data set and reopen it using NSR optimization.

Coding rules are:

- The *count* value must be between 0 and 255 (inclusive).
- The *percent* value must be between 0 and 99 (inclusive).

If DMS=(0,0) is coded, DMS will effectively be turned off for this access of the data set.

DSIZEMX=value{K|KB|M|MB}

The DSIZEMX override record identifies the maximum bufferspace that IOO will allocate for the data component during an LSR optimization. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 134,217,728 (128MB).
- A value of zero will cause the override to be ignored. The value in the selected optimization rule will be used.
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB are supported, but optional. If you omit the suffix, the specified value in bytes is used. For example:
 - 128K means 128 kilobytes.
 - 128MB means 128 megabytes.
 - 128 means 128 bytes.

Example:

Example	Meaning
DSIZEMX=64MB	Use a maximum of 64MB of data buffers for an LSR optimization selected by this rule.

FLAGS=(option1,option2,...)

The FLAGS override record identifies additional IOO optimization options. Supported options for VSAM optimizations are:

Option	Meaning	
FLAGS=(ACCNVRPL)	Directs IOO to allow Request Parameter Lists (RPLs) not specifically marked as being VSAM RPLs to be processed by the VSAM Record Level Interface. By default, the VSAM Record Level Interface will not process an RPL that is not marked as being a VSAM RPL.	
FLAGS=(ALCBUF31)	Directs IOO to allow non-COBOL programs to use RMODE31 buffers.	
FLAGS=(EXCEEDCA)	Directs IOO to allow a component's bufferspace to exceed the size of a Control Area (CA). By default, IOO will use the CA size as one of the maximums for a component's bufferspace.	
FLAGS=(IGNHURBA)	Directs IOO to ignore the highest-used-RBA value (extracted from the catalog) when attempting to determine the maximum size of a component.	
FLAGS=(REUSESHR)	Directs IOO to reuse an application's original LSR shrpool number when all other shrpool numbers have been used.	
FLAGS=(USEVRPLM)	Directs IOO to use the buffer counts in an application BLDVRP macro as the minimums for its optimization.	
The following options direct IOO to negate the requested option (if the option is present within the selected optimization rule). If coded with the requested option, this value takes precedence:		
FLAGS=(NO_ACCNVRPL)	Negates the ACCNVRPL option.	
FLAGS=(NO_ALCBUF31)	Negates the ALCBUF31 option.	
FLAGS=(NO_EXCEEDCA)	Negates the EXCEEDCA option.	
FLAGS=(NO_IGNHURBA)	Negates the IGNHURBA option.	
FLAGS=(NO_REUSESHR)	Negates the REUSESHR option.	
FLAGS=(NO_USEVRPLM)	Negates the USEVRPLM option.	

For example, if the following were coded, the NO_ACCNVRPL value would supercede the ACCNVRPL value:

FLAGS=(ACCNVRPL,ALCBUF31,NO_ACCNVRPL)

ISIZEMX=value{K|KB|M|MB}

The ISIZEMX override record identifies the maximum bufferspace that IOO will allocate for the index component during an LSR optimization. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 134,217,728 (128MB).
- A value of zero will cause the override to be ignored. The value in the selected optimization rule will be used.
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB are supported, but optional. If you omit the suffix, the specified value in bytes is used. For example:

- 128K means 128 kilobytes.
- 128MB means 128 megabytes.
- 128 means 128 bytes.

Example:

Example	Meaning	
ISIZEMX=16MB	Use a maximum of 16MB of index buffers for an LSR optimization selected by this rule.	

VSI=(option1,option2,...)

The VSI override record identifies the options to be set for the VSAM Record Level Interface (RLI). The following options are supported:

Option	Meaning	
VSI=0FF	Deactivate the interface for this optimization.	
VSI=ON	Activate the interface for this optimization.	
VSI=NODBM	Do not the activate the Dynamic Buffer Management (DBM) feature for this optimization. The DBM feature will determine whether or not the issuer of an I/O request is a COBOL program or not. If it is a COBOL program, DBM will allow the use of RMODE31 buffers. If it is not a COBOL program, DMS will not allow the use of RMODE31 buffers unless the optimization was performed using FLAGS=ALCBUF31. Coding NODBM will cause this check to be bypassed by the IOO VSAM Record Level Interface.	
VSI=NODBT	Do not activate the Dynamic Buffer Translation (DBT) feature for this optimization. The DBT feature will cause IOO to provide buffer translation services for GET/GETX requests using locate mode.	
VSI=NODLP	Do not activate the Dynamic LSR Positioning (DLP) feature for this optimization. The DLP feature will cause IOO to position to the first record of a data set when opened using LSR optimization.	
VSI=NODMS	Do not activate the Dynamic Mode Selection (DMS) feature for this optimization. The DMS feature will cause IOO to switch from LSR optimization to NSR optimization when the number of consecutive sequential requests exceeds the defined threshold.	

Coding rules are:

- Any combination of the supported values is allowed.
- If both OFF and ON are coded, the last one coded is the one used.
- If OFF is coded, all VSI features are deactivated for the data set access.

Examples:

Example	Meaning
VSI=(ON,NO_DMS)	Activate the VSAM Record Level Interface, but do not allow DMS support to be used for this access of the data set.
VSI=(OFF,NO_DMS)	Deactivate the VSAM Record Level Interface. Because OFF was coded, the NO_DMS coding is not needed, but is allowed.
VSI=(ON,OFF)	Deactivate the VSAM Record Level Interface. When ON and OFF are both coded, the last one coded is used.

Common Override Records

Common override records apply to both VSAM and non-VSAM processing. Common override records are:

- STC
- TRACE

These records are described in the following sections.

STC={YES|NO}

The STC override record identifies whether or not started tasks matching the DCF rule can be selected for optimization. This value overrides any STC value coded either in the global table or in the DCF input stream as a global table override. The shipped global table default is STC=YES. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning
STC=NO	Started tasks are not allowed to be selected by this DCF rule. When a started task matches the criteria for this DCF rule, IOO will continue its processing with the next rule. All other tasks matching the criteria for this DCF rule will be allowed to match the rule. Coding STC=N0 within a DCF rule differs from the coding of a global value of STC=N0 as follows:
	 A global value of STC=NO will cause IOO to bypass optimization of ALL started tasks.
	 A value of STC=NO on a DCF rule will cause IOO to bypass optimization of only those started tasks that match the criteria of the DCF rule.
STC=YES	Started tasks are allowed to be selected by this DCF rule. Coding STC=YES for a DCF rule is ignored if a global value of STC=YES is coded.

Example:

Example	Meaning
STC=YES	Allow started tasks to be selected by this DCF rule even though STC=N0 may be set globally.

TRACE=(value,...,value)

The TRACE override record identifies the trace options to be set when the DCF rule is matched. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning
CSR	Select normal trace for the IOO CSR component.
DCF	Select normal trace for the IOO DCF component.
DCFD	Select detail trace for the IOO DCF component.
DEX	Select normal trace for the IOO DEX component.
DMM	Select normal trace for the IOO DMM component.
JFC	Select normal trace for the IOO JFC component.
JFCD	Select detail trace for the IOO JFC component.
OPN	Select normal trace for the IOO OPN component.
OPND	Select detail trace for the IOO OPN component.
VSI	Select normal trace for the IOO VSI component.
VSM	Select normal trace for the IOO VSM component.
VSMD	Select detail trace for the IOO VSM component.

You should request TRACE only when asked to do so by Customer Support. Requesting trace incorrectly can add significant overhead to IOO.

Global Table Override Records

Global table override records are identified by the presence of the characters GBT (either in uppercase or lowercase) as the first value of the input DCF record. The characters GBT must be followed by at least one space. A supported global table override operand must then be present.

Supported global table override operands are:

- BLKMSG
- BUFMSG
- DD_OFF
- DD_ON
- DD_SOFF
- DD_SON
- EREGION
- SETBLK
- SETBUF
- SETRGN
- SMF

- STC
- TRCLIM
- TSOMSG
- VMAXHSPC
- VMAXSPC
- VMINHSPC
- VMINSPC

The following sections describe these records.

GBT BLKMSG={WTO|WTL|JESYSMSG|NO}

The BLKMSG override record identifies the message processing option when either of the following is true:

- IOO reblocks a non-VSAM data set (reblocking is selected).
- IOO identifies a non-VSAM data set that could have been reblocked, but reblocking was not allowed.

The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning
GBT BLKMSG=NO	IOO will not issue any reblocking messages.
GBT BLKMSG=WTL	IOO will use the IBM WTL macro to issue reblocking messages.
GBT BLKMSG=WTO	IOO will use the IBM WTO macro to issue reblocking messages.
GBT BLKMSG=JESYSMSG	IOO will direct all re-blocking messages to the JESYSMSG DD statement. This is the default value in the shipped global table.

GBT BUFMSG={WTO|WTL|JESYSMSG|NO}

The BUFMSG override record identifies the message processing option when IOO rebuffers a data set (whether VSAM or non-VSAM). The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning
GBT BUFMSG=NO	IOO will not issue any rebuffering messages.
GBT BUFMSG=WTL	IOO will use the IBM WTL macro to issue rebuffering messages.
GBT BUFMSG=WTO	IOO will use the IBM WTO macro to issue rebuffering messages.
GBT BUFMSG=JESYSMSG	IOO will direct all rebuffering messages to the JESYSMSG DD statement. This is the default value in the shipped global table.

GBT {DD_OFF|DD_ON}=ddname

The GBT DD_OFF override record identifies the DDname whose presence in a step will cause IOO processing to be bypassed until either the end of the step or until a new IOO DDname domain is encountered.

The GBT DD_ON override record identifies the DDname whose presence in a step will cause IOO processing to be selected for any subsequent DD statements until either the end of the step or until a new IOO DDname domain is encountered.

Any valid DDname may be coded.

The shipped defaults in the IOO global table are:

- DD_OFF=ULT@OFF
- DD_ON =ULT@ON

If the current DDname falls within the domain of either of these IOO DDnames, the DCF rule table will NOT be searched.

Examples:

The following DCF input is used in the examples. (Note that the DD_ON value is allowed to default):

SELECT=ALL
STEP=STEP1
BYPASS=ALL
STEP=STEP2
GBT DD_OFF=I00$OFF
```

Example		Meaning
//STEP1 EXEC //SYSIN DD //SYSUT2 DD //IOO\$OFF DD //SYSUT1 DD	PGM=PROG1 DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.CONTROL.FILE DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.OUTPUT.FILE DUMMY DISP=SHR,DSN=MY.INPUT.FILE	IOO processing would be bypassed for DDname SYSUT1 because it falls within the domain of the DD_OFF DDname of IOO\$OFF. The domain of the IOO\$OFF DDname would extend to the end of the step since there is no ULT@ON DDname subsequent to it in the JCL. IOO would search the DCF rules table when DDnames SYSIN and SYSUT2 are accessed since those DDnames fall outside the domain of any IOO DDname.

The domain of the ULT@ON DDname is terminated after the SYSUT2 DDname due to the presence of the IOO\$OFF DDname. IOO processing would be bypassed for DDname SYSUT1 because it falls within the domain of the DD_OFF DDname of IOO\$OFF. The domain of the IOO\$OFF DDname would extend to the end of the step because there is no ULT@ON DDname subsequent to it in the JCL. IOO would search the DCF rules table for DDname SYSIN because it is outside the domain of an IOO DDname. Due to the DCF rules used in the example, DDname SYSIN would be bypassed for processing by IOO.

GBT {DD_SOFF|DD_SON}=ddname

The GBT DD_SOFF override record identifies the DDname to be bypassed for IOO processing for the entire step.

The GBT DD_SON override record identifies the DDname to be selected for IOO processing for the entire step.

If either of these DDnames is present in the step's JCL, the DCF rules table will not be searched.

You can code any valid DDname. The shipped defaults in the IOO global table are:

- DD_SOFF=ULT@SOFF
- DD_SON=ULT@SON

Examples:

The following DCF input is used in the examples. (Note that the DD_SON value is allowed to default):

SELECT=ALL
STEP=STEP1
BYPASS=ALL
STEP=STEP2
GBT DD_SOFF=I00$SOFF
```

Example			Meaning

GBT EREGION=value{K/KB/M/MB}

This override record identifies the extended region size (the region above the 16MB line) to be set by IOO's Dynamic Memory Management (DMM) feature. Coding rules are:

- The value must be between 0 and 536,870,912 (512MB).
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB are supported.
- The default value in the shipped global table varies with the selected start-up option as follows:
 - Start-up options K0, K1, K3 and K4 use a default of 128MB.
 - Start-up options K2 and K5 use a default of 256MB.

Example:

Example	Meaning
GBT EREGION=300M	Use an extended region size of 300MB.

GBT SETBLK={YES|NO}

This override record identifies the status of the IOO reblocking feature. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning	
GBT SETBLK=NO	IOO reblocking is not to be allowed.	
GBT SETBLK=YES	IOO reblocking is to be allowed.	

The default value in the shipped global table varies with the selected start-up option as follows:

- Start-up options K0-K2 use a default of GBT SETBLK=NO.
- Start-up options K3-K5 use a default of GBT SETBLK=YES.

Example:

Example	Meaning
GBT SETBLK=YES Allow IOO reblocking.	

GBT SETBUF={YES|NO}

This override record identifies the status of the IOO rebuffering feature. This record applies to both VSAM and non-VSAM rebuffering. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning	
GBT SETBUF=NO	IOO rebuffering is not to be allowed.	
GBT SETBUF=YES	IOO rebuffering is to be allowed. This value is the default in the shipped global table. It applies to all start-up options.	

Example:

Example	Meaning	
GBT SETBUF=YES	Allow IOO rebuffering.	

GBT SETRGN={YES|NO}

This override record identifies the status of the IOO Dynamic Memory Management (DMM) feature. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning	
GBT SETRGN=NO	DMM is not to be activated.	
GBT SETRGN=YES	DMM is to be activated. This value is the default in the shipped global table. It applies to all start-up options.	

Example:

Example	Meaning
GBT SETRGN=YES	Activate DMM.

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NOTE See "Dynamic Memory Management (DMM) Considerations" on page 14 for more information about DMM.

GBT SMF=(*number,options*)

This override record identifies the information that IOO needs for the recording of IOO's user SMF records. This record has the following values:

Value	Meaning		
number	The SMF record number that IOO is to use. A value of 0 causes no IOO SMF records to be written. A value between 128 and 255 (inclusive) causes IOO SMF records to be written. The default value in the shipped global table is SMF=(0). This default requests that no SMF records be written. It applies to all start-up options.		
options	Identify which IG coded if an SMF are supported:	OO SMF records are to be written. This value need not be record number of 0 is coded. The following option values	
	QSAMBUF	Write an IOO SMF record when IOO rebuffers a non-VSAM data set.	
	REBLOCK	Write an IOO SMF record when IOO reblocks a data set.	
	VSAMBUF	Write an IOO SMF record when IOO rebuffers a VSAM data set.	

Examples

GBT STC={YES|NO}

This override record identifies whether or not IOO is to select started tasks for optimization. This value sets the default to be used during the processing of DCF rules. It can be overridden by an STC operand coded on a matched DCF rule. The following values are supported:

Value	Meaning	
GBT STC=NO	Started tasks are not allowed to be selected by default.	
GBT STC=YES	Started task are allowed to be selected by default. The shipped global table default is GBT STC=YES.

GBT TRCLIM=value

This override option identifies the maximum number of trace lines that can be issued by the IOO VSAM Record Level Interface for an optimization. Once the trace limit has been reached, no more trace messages will be produced for the optimization being traced. The coded value must be numeric and must be between 0 and 9999.

GBT VMAXHSPC=value{K|KB|M|MB}

This override option identifies the maximum hiperspace buffers that IOO will allow for a data or index component. Coding rules are:

- The numeric value must be between 0 and 134,217,728 (128MB).
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB may be used.
- A value of 0 for VMAXHSPC indicates that no hiperspace buffers are to be used.

The shipped global table default is GBT VMAXHSPC=32MB.

GBT VMINHSPC=*value*{K|KB|M|MB}

This override option identifies the minimum hiperspace buffers that IOO will allow for a data or index component. Coding rules are:

The numeric value must be between 0 and 134,217,728 (128MB).

• Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB may be used.

The shipped global table default is GBT VMINHSPC=0.

GBT VMINHSPC=0	Do not enforce a minimum value.

GBT VMAXSPC=value{K|KB|M|MB}

This override option identifies the maximum bufferspace that IOO will allow for both the data and index components. Coding rules are:

- The numeric value cannot exceed 134,217,728 (128MB).
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB may be used.

The shipped global table default is 32MB.

Example:

Example	Meaning
GBT VMAXSPC=16MB	Allow a maximum of 16MB bufferspace.

GBT VMINSPC=value{K|KB|M|MB}

This override option identifies the minimum bufferspace that IOO will allow for an NSR optimization when either of the following is true:

- The optimization rule contained a specific bufferspace.
- The use of NSR was being forced. The enforcing of a minimum value ensures the presence of sufficient buffers for instances where the IOO VSAM Record Level Interface is switching from LSR optimization to NSR optimization.

Coding rules are:

- The numeric value cannot exceed 134,217,728 (128MB).
- Suffixes of K, KB, M, and MB may be used.

The shipped global table default is 32KB.

Example:6

Example	Meaning
GBT VMINSPC=64MB	Ensure a minimum of 64KB bufferspace.

Chapter 4 Statistics

StarTool IOO lets you see the attributes and activity associated with each VSAM cluster through statistical reports. There are two types of statistic reports:

- Basic. The basic statistics contain VSAM cluster information such as Data Buffers, Index Buffers, CI Size, CI Splits, and CA Splits.
- **Extended**. Extended statistics contain all of the information contained in the basic statistics plus additional information including gets, puts, points, verifies, and deletes.

The statistics appear in your job output under the DD NAME JESYSMSG JES2.

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Activating Statistics

To globally turn on and off the statistics, you must alter the Global Rules Table (see Appendix A, "Rules Tables"). The two parameters that affect the statistics are STATS and STATTHLD.

STATS allows you to turn the statistics feature off and on. In addition, STATS lets you choose the type of statistics, basic or extended. The format of the STATS parameter is:

STATS=(<u>YES</u>|NO, <u>BASIC</u>|EXTENDED)

The default value for STATS is STATS=(YES, BASIC).



NOTE If extended statistics are turned on, more CPU cycles are needed for each I/O.

STATTHLD determines the threshold (that is, the EXCP count of the data component of the VSAM data set) before the statistics are produced. This parameter allows you to defer the statistics for those programs with little or no I/O. For example, if STATTHLD=0, then each time the program ends, statistics are produced. The format of the STATTHLD parameter is:

STATTHLD=xxx

where xxx is a number from 0 to 32K.

The default value for STATTHLD is 10. If you want to turn the statistics feature on or off for a particular job, refer to "System Rules" on page 91.

Basic Statistics

This section describes the fields found in StarTool IOO statistics. The statistics that you see depend on your job, whether it is run in Nonshared Resources (NSR) or Local Shared Resources (LSR).

For NSR and LSR jobs, information includes data buffers, index buffers, CI size, CI splits, and CA splits. For LSR jobs, additional information such as buffer lookasides, user-initiated writes and VSAM forced writes are included in the statistics output.

LSR Example with Shared Data/Index Components

Here is an example of statistics when a file is placed in LSR and the data/index components share the same LSR pool:

LSR Example with Nonshared Data/Index Components

This is an example of a file in LSR where the Data/Index components do not share the same LSR pool. Notice that the difference between this statistics block and the one above is that the LSR information is detailed for both the Data and Index. Moreover, both the Data and Index have Buffer LOOKASIDES, User-Initiated Writes, and VSAM Forces Writes.

Also, since the data and index do not share the same pool, you see exactly how many buffers for each. In this case, there are 25 Data Buffers and 5 Index Buffers.

Appendix A Rules Tables

This appendix describes the advanced functionality of StarTool IOO that allows for unique tuning requirements. It also gives insight into the system facilities that StarTool IOO controls and manipulates to achieve its performance results.



NOTE The default rules allow complete use of the product. It is not necessary to ever code rules. We strongly recommend that you use default rules that contain thoroughly tested rules with all known compatibility problems bypassed, because you could introduce errors by coding new rules.

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Controlling StarTool IOO using Rules

You can control StarTool IOO through customizable tables. If you want to make rule modifications, read this section to understand how to code and customize them. The three rules tables are as follows.

Table	Description
Global Rules	Contains StarTool IOO global rules and startup options.
Device Rules	Allows you to tailor different blocksize targets/goals for different devices in order to capitalize on device performance differences.
System Rules	Allows you to signify certain files to SELECT, EXEMPT, or BYPASS for types of optimization.



NOTE We reserve the right to change any or all rules (except DCF) at any time. Therefore, it is best that selections/bypasses be accomplished through DCF.

Global Rules

The purpose of the Global Rules Table is to define global rules and startup options.

Assembly and Link-Edit

The load module generated by assembling and link-editing these definitions must have the name ULTIGBxx where xx is a 2-character alphanumeric suffix. This member must reside in the same load library as the other StarTool IOO load modules. In addition, the load module must be link-edited with an authorization code of 1.

Sample Definitions

The source of the distributed ULTIGBxx table is included in the STRIOO.VvRrMm.SRC distribution library under member name ULTIGBxx. The JCL to assemble and link-edit this table is included in the STRIOO.VvRrMm.JCL library under member name IOOGASM.

Device Rules

The Device Rules Table is used for SAM reblocking and specifies optimal physical blocksizes based on the physical characteristics of a particular device-type (for example, 3380 = 1/2 track blocking); it is not used for VSAM. The Device Table allows you to tailor different blocksize targets/goals for different devices to capitalize on device performance differences. This is done by defining the target maximum block sizes to be used for a particular device. Performance and device utilization improvements are dependent on the target values defined.



NOTE Any data set created or residing on a device type not defined in this table will not be optimized by StarTool IOO.

Choose the Device Table that StarTool IOO uses by modifying the DVSUFX parameter in the Global Rules Table. See "Table Format" on page 80 for more information on the DVSUFX parameter.

A complete table of Device Rules is sent with StarTool IOO. Although it may be modified to your performance objectives, use the default table delivered with the product.

Assembly and Link-Edit

The load module generated by assembling and link-editing these definitions must be named ULTIDVxx where xx is a two-character alphanumeric suffix. This module must reside in the same library where all other StarTool IOO modules were installed. In addition, the load module must be link-edited with an authorization code of 1.

To use the new device table, change DVSUFX=xx to the alphanumeric suffix used in the link-editing above.

Sample Definitions

The source of the distributed ULTIDVT table is included in the STRIOO.VvRrMm.MAC library under member name ULTIDVT. The JCL to assemble and link-edit this table is included in the STRIOO.VvRrMm.JCL library under member name IOODASM. The JCL parameters, such as the unit names in this assembly JCL, must be changed to your installation standards.

Table Format

The format of the ULTIDVT macro used to generate the ULTIDVxx table is as follows:

System Rules

The System Rules Table defines the resources that must be optimized or not be optimized. StarTool IOO first examines the EXEMPT and BYPASS entries to determine if the data set should not be optimized. If no BYPASS entries exist for the data set name, then StarTool IOO searches for an exact match with any SELECT statements. If a matching SELECT statement is found for the data set, optimization occurs. If the data set does not match any SELECT statement, no optimization occurs. All precoded table definitions are shipped to you using both EXEMPTs, BYPASSes and SELECTs.

The System Rules Table used by StarTool IOO is the one with the two-character suffix that matches the option chosen when you started or modified StarTool IOO, such as S STARTIOO OPTION=xx. See Chapter 1, "Controlling IOO" on page 9 for more information on selecting StarTool IOO options.

Two types of system rules exist in the System Rules Table. Both are used by Micro Focus and may change with different releases of StarTool IOO.

System Rule	Description
Selection Rules	Define to StarTool IOO what Micro Focus does not allow to be optimized through a set of BYPASS and EXEMPT rules and SELECT rules that select everything and should <i>not</i> be used for user selections (DCF should be used for user selections).
Optimization Rules	Specify how and what to do when optimizing.

Coding

All the MODE=BYPASS entries must be coded first, followed by MODE=EXEMPT entries and then followed by the MODE=SELECT entries. If the entries are not coded in this sequence, StarTool IOO may ignore some of the MODE=EXEMPT or MODE=BYPASS entries during MIXMOD processing. Any or all of the keywords may be coded on a single entry. StarTool IOO looks for an exact match on all values coded before it decides what processing to perform.

Assembly and Link-Edit

The load module generated by assembling and link-editing definitions must have a name that consists of the prefix ULTITB and a two-character suffix. Use the two-character suffix of the Systems Rules Table as the option xx when starting and modifying StarTool IOO (OPTIONS=xx). The suffix must be two alphanumeric characters. You can alter these characters to generate variations of the system table to be used by one or more systems. The system table must reside in the same library where the other StarTool IOO modules were installed. In addition, the load module must be link-edited with an authorization code of 1.

Sample Definitions

The source of the distributed ULTITB*xx* tables are included in the STRIOO.V*v*R*r*M*m*.SRC distribution library under member name ULTITB*xx*. The JCL to assemble and link-edit this table is included in the STRIOO.V*v*R*r*M*m*.JCL library under member name IOOTASM. Some of the JCL parameters, such as the unit names, may have to be changed to conform to your installation standards.

MODE=BYPASS|EXEMPT|SELECT

Subparameter	Description
BYPASS	Defines resources <i>not</i> to be optimized for both input and output during BYPASS mode processing. For example, use this command to bypass a particular file that you do not want StarTool IOO to override LSR processing on.
EXEMPT	Defines resources <i>not</i> to be optimized for output during EXEMPT mode processing.
SELECT	Defines resources to be optimized during SELECT mode processing.

ACCMETH={QSAM} {BSAM} {VSAM} {EXCP} {BLDVRP}

Defines whether or not the SELECT entry is for QSAM, BSAM, VSAM, EXCP(SORTOUT only) or BLDVRP. QSAM is the default.

If a data set is accessed by both QSAM and BSAM, then code two SELECT entries, one for QSAM and one for BSAM. ACCMETH=EXCP must be coded with DDNAME=SORTOUT on the same select entry. (See page 99 for an explanation of BLDVRP).

JOB=jobname

Defines a jobname to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECT(ed) for processing. Use the keyword ALL to match all jobs.

STEP=stepname

Defines a stepname to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECT(ed) for processing. The stepname is equal to the lowest level stepname allowing you to bypass one step within a proc, not the entire proc.

NOTE If no proc exists: stepname = jobstepname. If proc exists: stepname = procstepname.

DDNAME=ddname

Defines a DDname to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECT(ed) for processing.

DSNAME=data set name

Defines a data set name to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECT(ed) for StarTool IOO processing.

VOLSER=volume serial number

Defines a tape or disk volume serial number to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECTed for processing.

PROGRAM=program name

Defines the program name coded in the EXEC PGM=*program* JCL statement. StarTool IOO recognizes the program defined in the EXEC JCL statement, and all other programs LINKed to and from this program are automatically included.

You can SELECT, BYPASS or EXEMPT any JOB, STEP, DDNAME, DSNAME, VOLSER, or PROGRAM by the appropriate prefix. To do so, code the following:

JPREFIX=jobname prefix SPREFIX=stepname prefix DPREFEIX=ddname prefix PREFIX=data set name prefix VPREFIX=volume serial number prefix PPREFIX=program name prefix

When using the appropriate prefix, you can add an offset *nn* from the beginning of any JOB, STEP, DDNAME, DSNAME, VOLSER, or PROGRAM. To do so, code:

DPREFIX=(ddname prefix,nn)
PREFIX=(data set name prefix,nn)

DEVADDR=*xxx*

Defines a tape or disk device address to be BYPASS(ed), EXEMPT(ed) or SELECT(ed) for processing.

xxx represents a three-character device address defined to the operating system by your systems programmer during I/O generation, such as 190 or 39C.

BLKSIZE=maximum block size

Defines an override block size to be used when optimizing this data set. Override blocksizes ignore the target blocksize on the device table and are not normally coded. Code a compatible blocksize for the data set residing on a specific device type. The maximum value that can be coded is 32760.

Code this option only for items like DDNAMES for SYSGO since the linkage editor has an artificially small blocksize limitation.

BUFNI=(number index buffers,CKSTRNO)

BUFNI allocates the number of I/O index buffers placed on the VSAM data set when it is opened and placed in NSR.

CKSTRNO is an optional parameter. If specified, StarTool IOO sets the number of index buffers to the value specified in STRNO + 1 when processing SEQUENTIALLY. When processing DIRECT, StarTool IOO sets the number of index buffers to the number index buffers.

If CKSTRNO is not specified, the number of index buffers is set to the number index buffers specified for both SEQUENTIAL and DIRECT.

BUFND=(number data buffers,CKSTRNO)

BUFND specifies the number of I/O data buffers VSAM uses for transmitting data between virtual and auxiliary storage for KSDSs, ESDSs, and RRDSs.

CKSTRNO is an optional parameter. If specified, StarTool IOO sets the number of index buffers to the value specified in number data buffers when processing SEQUENTIALLY. When processing DIRECT, StarTool IOO sets the number of index buffers to the STRNO + 1.

If CKSTRNO is not specified, the number of index buffers is set to the number index buffers specified for both SEQUENTIAL and DIRECT.

BUFFER={(CKSTRNO,xxxxx)} or BUFFER={(SPACE,xxxxx)}

VSAM only

BUFFER allocates the total amount of buffer space to be used when calculating data and index buffers for VSAM. If you specify less space than specified in the BUFFERSPACE parameter of the DEFINE command when the data set was defined or what was specified in BUFSP within the Access Control Block (ACB) in the program, the larger value is used.

If *xxxxx* is greater than BUFNI plus BUFND, then remaining buffers are allocated differently depending on the keyword that you specify.

If you specify **CKSTRNO**:

QSAM only

VSAM only

VSAM only

- For MACRF=DIR processing, StarTool IOO makes the number of data buffers equal to STRNO + 1 and then allocates the exact *xxxxx* amount to use for index CI buffers.
- For MACRF=SEQ processing, StarTool IOO makes the number of index buffers equal to STRNO + 1 and then allocates the remaining *xxxxx* to use for data CI buffers.

If you specify **SPACE**:

- If the xxxxxx amount is greater than the amount called for by BUFNI and BUFND, the extra space is allocated as follows: For MACRF=DIR processing, only index buffers are allocated; for MACRF=SEQ processing, one additional index buffer and as many data buffers as possible are allocated.
- If the *xxxxxx* amount is less than the amount called for by BUFNI and BUFND, the number of data and index buffers are decreased as follows:
 - MACRF=DIR Number of data buffers are decreased to the amount specified but not fewer than the minimum number required. If more space remains to be decreased, the number of index buffers is decreased until the amount called for by the combined BUFNI and BUFND complies with the BUFSP amount.
 MACRF=SEQ Number of index buffers is decreased to not fewer than 1 more than the minimum required. If more space remains to be decreased, the number of data buffers is decreased but never

decreased more than the minimum number required to process.

BUFFER={(NUMBER,xx)},{(TRACKS,xx)}, or BUFFER={(SPACE,xxxxxx)}

QSAM only

In QSAM, xx defines the number of buffers, tracks, or the amount of space to be used when optimizing a data set that matches the search criteria. This value overrides the device table value if that was coded. Normally, the device table should not be used. Manipulate buffers using this parameter in this table and do not use the device table space values.

Subparameter	Description
AUTO	Specify only for Local Shared Resources (LSR). It invokes the BLDVRP (BuiLD VSAM Resource Pool) macro based on the information in the catalog (Index CIsize, Data CIsize, key length) and the overridden ACB. StarTool IOO builds a buffer pool large enough to hold the entire number of index and data CIs that the file contains, up to the ISIZEMAX= and DSIZEMAX= maximum limit. Use this command if you want to manually force the use of specific resource pools. This command manually issues BLDVRPs; the following parameters can only be specified for Local Shared Resources (LSR). StarTool IOO issues this manual BLDVRP (build VSAM resource pool) macro based on the information that you code in this macro. It is your responsibility to use this macro correctly. StarTool IOO does not figure out what is optimum; it uses whatever you code and simply issues the BLDVRP based on your parameters.

BLDVRP=AUTO is the default, so you must code BLDVRP=, to bypass automatic optimization.

If you want StarTool IOO to determine what is optimal, do not use this manual BLDVRP, instead use BLDVRP=AUTO.

StarTool IOO assumes that you understand how to use a manual BLDVRP and does not perform validity checking. When processing a KSDS, the index and data components share the buffers of a buffer pool. When an alternate index is used to process against a base cluster, the alternate index and the base cluster share buffers. Each component uses the buffer pool whose buffers are exactly the right size or the next larger size. Additionally, the combined total of all sizes and numbers cannot be greater than the MAXSPC value in the Global table. These are possible values for <i>size, number,</i> and <i>Hiperspace:</i>

Defines whether or not this SELECT is to operate on VSAM data sets opened for Sequential, Direct, Skip Sequential, or Dynamic access; opened for Input, Output (COBOL uses RST for output) or I/O using Non Shared Resources or Local Shared Resources. Any combination of the above options can be coded.

DMSHWM=(yyy,zz)

All VSAM

Defines the threshold (High Water Mark) for DMS (Dynamic Mode Selection). If you define these values, StarTool IOO monitors the I/O into LSR and if the amount of SEQUENTIAL accesses exceeds the threshold values, StarTool IOO changes modes.

DMS uses the smaller matched value of *yyy* or *zz* based upon DMS=(YES,MIN) in Global Table. DMS uses the largest matched value of the two numbers, *yyy* and *zz*, if DMS=(YES,MAX) is specified in Global.

Also, if *yyy* and *zz* are both zero(0), it is the same as having DMS=NO in the Global Table except it applies only to this entry.

Subparameter	Description
ALCBUF31	StarTool IOO can use dynamic buffer management (DBM) to detect when to put ALC programs' buffers below the 16M line. This operand allows you to override DBM for this entry. Assembler programs can use VSAMs control block structure to access data buffers instead of going through the VSAM access method, and a user may need access to some of the accounting data saved in the placeholder(PLH). If StarTool IOO put buffers and control blocks above the line, this program could abend. Therefore, DBM dynamically places ALC program-buffers and control blocks below the line.
BIASDYNM	StarTool IOO uses a biasing technique to allocate buffers on dynamic opens.
BIASDIR	StarTool IOO uses a biasing technique to allocate buffers on direct opens.

VSAM Hiperspaces

Make the task that is accessing this file Non-Swappable since it is using Hiperspaces and Hiperspaces only exist while you are swapped in. Use this parameter if you want to use Hiperspaces on batch jobs.

OVRMAC=([NSR|LSR]

VSAM only

Use these parameters to override any MACRF parameters that are specified in the program. In COBOL, MACRF parameters are usually impossible to override.

Use caution because it is possible to specify illogical combinations across groups and some options require program modifications. All of these MACRF parameters work differently from the normal StarTool IOO parameters in that if you do not specify the parameter, StarTool IOO does not default to anything and does not override anything with this default. The items underlined are VSAM/AMS defaults, not defaults of StarTool IOO; therefore, they override values in the ACB only if they are specified in the StarTool IOO system table. Each item in a group that is specified in the StarTool IOO table turns off any other item in that group in the ACB.

The following items are grouped in the order that you would most likely override the ACB (1=most likely to use; 8=least likely to use):

Group 1

NIS	Normal insert strategy for Direct processing. Divides the CI into two parts always at the midpoint for CI splits.
SIS	Sequential insert strategy efficiently inserts contiguous keys while processing directly. Divides the CI up at the record you are trying to insert (SIS is always used for sequential processing; therefore, specifying SIS allows direct inserts to be processed identically to sequential processing).

Group 2

NSR	Non-shared resources.
LSR	Local shared resources. Generally used in conjunction with Deferred Writes, Group 3. (Should also code BLDVRP=AUTO).

Group 3

NDF	Writes are not deferred for direct PUTs.
DFR	Direct PUT requests are deferred until the buffer is needed. Implies sharing resources (LSR). Should also code BLDVRP if the program was not coded to build its own VSAM resource pool; For example, COBOL programs).

Group 4

AMODE31	Running with NSR and you want buffers allocated above the 16 MB line.

Groups 5 - 8

NFX|CFX, NCI|ICI, NUB|UBF and DDN|DSN MACRFs are supported.

OVRAMP={YES|NO}

VSAM only

This statement causes StarTool IOO to override any AMP parameters in the JCL as well as any program ACB or catalog entries.

SETBLK={YES|<u>NO</u>}

QSAM ONLY

VSAM / QSAM

SETBLK=YES defines that the SELECT entry invoke actual blocksize optimization action (blocksize changes). NO is the default if this parameter is omitted. NO says that the SELECT entry does not optimize but it will produce StarTool IOO Notification message to the job log, system log, and console (as if it did optimize).

SETBUF={<u>YES</u>|NO}

SETBUF=YES must be specified in the system table SELECT statements as well as the global table to enable StarTool IOO rebuffering and Start I/O optimization function. If SETBUF=NO is specified or the parameter is omitted, the number of buffers is determined by your installation's BUFNO default.

SETMAC={YES|<u>NO</u>}

VSAM only

Determines whether or not StarTool IOO is to override any MACRF parameters in the ACB.

STATS=(YES|NO, BASIC|EXTENDED)

STATS turns StarTool IOO statistic feature on and off. STATS also specifies whether or not you collect BASIC statistics or EXTENDED statistics. If you specify STATS=(YES), then you will get YES, BASIC. To turn the statistics feature off, specify STATS=(NO). The STATS specification in the System Rules Table supersedes the STATS specification made in the Global Table.



NOTE If extended statistics are turned on, more CPU cycles are needed for each I/O.

STATTHLD=xxx

xxx defines threshold that must be met or exceeded before statistics are printed. This keyword allows you to limit the amount of statistics from jobs that do little or no I/O. xxx can be a number from 0 to 32K. If you specify STATTHLD=0, then each time a data set is closed, you will see the statistics. Use in conjunction with the parameter STATS.

VSI=(ON|OFF) (NODLP,NODMS,NODBM,NODBT)

All VSAM

VSI is the I/O interface function that provides services at I/O time. This parameter allows you to specify exactly what portion of these functions you want.

Function	Description
DLP (Dynamic LSR Positioning)	Performs positioning for NSR coded programs that use LSR.
DMS (Dynamic Mode Selection)	Changes from LSR to NSR if a lot of sequential processing is performed.
DBM (Dynamic Buffer Management)	Detects if BAL program issuing I/O and other factors and forces the program to use below the 16 Megabyte line buffers.
DBT (Dynamic Buffer Translation)	Performs buffer translation for above the line buffers so programs not coded in 31 bit mode can use above the 16 Megabyte line buffers.

The functions that VSI contains are:

Function	Description
ON	Turns on the capability for all of these to be active.
OFF	Turns off all of these functions simultaneously.
NODxx	Turns off each function individually. Multiple NODxx statements can be specified on the same VSI statement. For example, VSI=(NODLP,NODMS,NODBM) leaves Dynamic Buffer Translation operating but shuts off all other functions of VSI.

Rules Example

The first entry selects the BLDVRP override for a job with the stepname of ABC by allowing StarTool IOO to get control when step ABC is going to issue its BLDVRP.

The second entry selects any files in step ABC that already use LSR (DIR or DYNAM access) and overrides them to put them in a separate sharepool that is optimized for each file component.
